NORTH CENTRAL OHIO REVITALIZATION FOUNDATION

Providing resources to assist local established churches in revitalizing ministry in their context and community.

Americans are choosing to go to church less and less. Adult church attendance in our communities has fallen from 34% to 31% in the last 7 years. (Gallup 2023). The local church is struggling financially as it attempts to minister to and connect with its communities.

Meanwhile, we have a life-giving message that our communities need to hear!



What if there was a vehicle to provide resources for ministry growth and community engagement that could directly benefit our local churches?

The NCO Revitalization Foundation has been established to raise funds to assist our churches, with accountable resources so that ministries can flourish, and lives can be forever changed.

The Foundation was seeded with \$50,000 in 2023 and now has a fund of over \$500,000 in 2025 with a goal of raising \$1,000,000. Gains from these funds will be disbursed to assist churches in sharing Jesus in their local context and to help reinvigorate ministry. Because ministry happens in diverse ways, applications can be made based on specific needs to help the local church fulfill its mission and change lives. The Foundation will process applications and disburse funds annually at District Assembly.

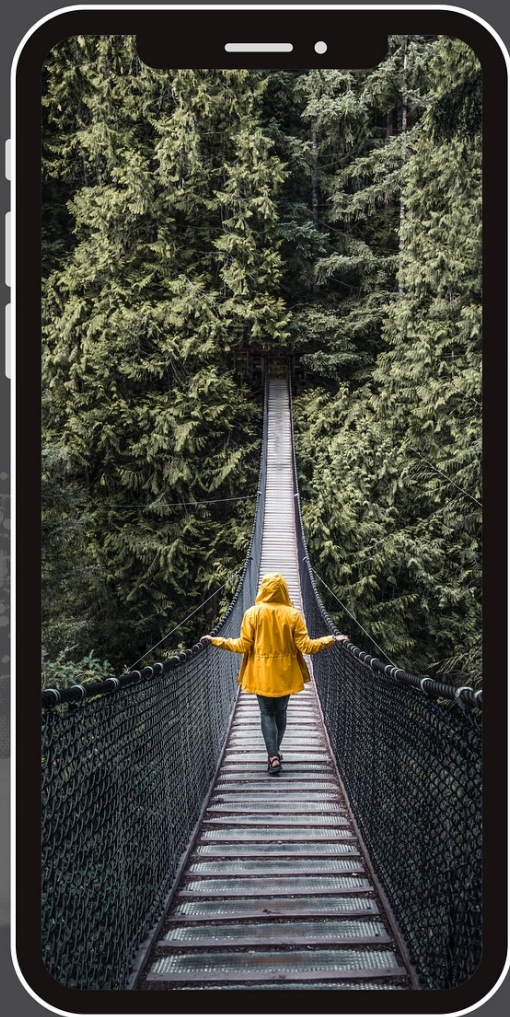

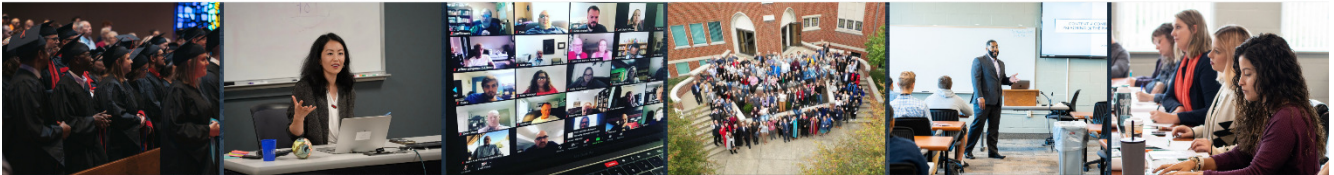

GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT IN JURISDICTION



The 30th General Assembly, held in June 2023, elected Dr. Christian D. Sarmiento as the 45th general superintendent in the Church of the Nazarene. At the time of his election, he had been the Director of the South America Region since September 2005.

Sarmiento was born in Bogotá, Colombia. Dr. Gerald Johnson ordained him in 1989. Dr. Sarmiento and his wife, Margit, were among the first members of the Church of the Nazarene, and he became the denomination's first pastor, in Colombia in 1976. Sarmiento also had pastorates in Ecuador and was instrumental in planting churches in Costa Rica, Colombia, and Guatemala. Dr. Sarmiento served as district superintendent of the Ecuador Sierra Norte District. He also served as Regional Education Coordinator in South America, the former MAC region (Mexico and Central America, now Mesoamerica), and the Caribbean Region. Sarmiento was the rector of the Bolivia Nazarene Seminary, the Cono Sur Nazarene Seminary in Argentina, and El Seminario Teológico Sudamericano in Quito, Ecuador, and taught at several seminaries on these regions. Before being Regional Director in South America, Dr. Sarmiento also served as Regional Director for MAC, based in Guatemala City. The Sarmientos served as missionaries in Bolivia, Ecuador, and the Caribbean Regional Office, beginning in 1986. Dr. Sarmiento also served as Regional Youth Coordinator for South America and the Caribbean Region, and as Jesus Film Coordinator for the Caribbean Region.

Dr. Sarmiento received a Bachelor of Arts degree from MidAmerica Nazarene University in 1980 and a Master of Divinity at Nazarene Theological Seminary in 1984. MidAmerica Nazarene University conferred a Doctor of Divinity degree upon him in 2001. He earned a Doctor of Education in leadership and professional practice at Trevecca Nazarene University in 2019.

He was a member of the International Board of Education for several terms, and served on the steering committee of the Manual of the Church of the Nazarene in Global English. For three quadrennia, he served on the Commission of the International Church. Sarmiento presided over the translating of the Manual into Spanish. He also served as a committee member considering Article of Faith IV, on the Scriptures. Sarmiento was the president of the Spanish Literature Committee for over 30 years.

Sarmiento was the associate editor of the ten volume Spanish edition of the Beacon Bible Commentary, and other Spanish-language ministerial texts. He served as editor of the *Conquista Juvenil* (Spanish youth periodical), *El Sendero de la Verdad* (adult Spanish Sunday School periodical), and the *Spanish Preacher's Magazine*. He has also published numerous articles and book chapters, and authored several books: *Visitas Con Lucas*; *Training of Altar Workers*; *Devotionals in Luke*; *To Be Like Him, Devotionals in Philipians*; and *The Perspective of the Eagle, Devotionals in the Gospel of John* (4 vols.) Dr. Sarmiento's teaching and preaching are widely known, and he is a sought-after speaker for pastor's retreats and events throughout Latin America.

Christian and Margit have three children, Monica, Christina, and Steven, and five grandchildren, Elijah, Charly, Jonah, Gracyn, and Abigail.

Trevor Johnston – Assistant District Superintendent

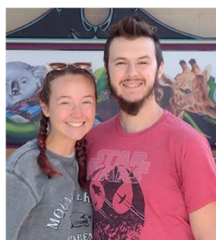

REPORTS TO THE ASSEMBLY



MINISTERIAL CREDENTIALS BOARD

2025-2026

The Ministerial Credentials Board makes the following statement regarding the use of digital and social media platforms: In accordance with the standards of a minister in the Church of the Nazarene serving on North Central Ohio District, all credentialed ministers are expected to model the holiness of Jesus Christ in every public sphere—including digital and social media platforms—by refraining from engaging in division or the airing of personal opinions that may undermine the unity of the Body of Christ or the dignity of the ministerial office. Reflecting the biblical mandate to be "quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry" (James 1:19) and the wisdom that to "answer before listening— is folly and shame" (Proverbs 18:13), ministers are strongly encouraged to ensure they possess all pertinent facts before responding to conflict online. We remind ministers to speak with Grace and Truth in accordance with the Manual of the Church of the Nazarene, which requires a minister to maintain understanding, purity, and kindness. (§ 502.3). It is strongly encouraged that ministers follow the Matthew 18 principle for conflict resolution, and it should be noted that any public speech characterized by a condemning fashion or inflammatory rhetoric toward individuals or groups may be deemed conduct unbecoming a minister, potentially resulting in formal disciplinary proceedings or the removal of ministerial credentials (§ 606).

Manual References:

§ 502.3 (The Call and Qualifications of the Minister): Emphasizes that a minister must have a "peaceable spirit," "purity of life," and "discretion."

§ 21.2 (Covenant of Christian Character): Urges all members and ministers to avoid "quarreling, returning evil for evil, gossiping, slandering, injuring the name of others."

§ 606 (Ministerial Discipline): Defines the grounds for discipline, which include "conduct unbecoming a minister".

James 1:19: "My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry."

Proverbs 18:13: "To answer before listening—that is folly and shame."

ASSEMBLY FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

2026

The Assembly Finance Committee of North Central Ohio met via Zoom on May 7, 2026, with the following members participating: Wendell D. Brown, District Superintendent; Patrick L. Rhoton, District Treasurer; Austin Swallow, chair, Sean Hampton, Pete Ryder, Rob Skidmore and Linda Wasil.

After introductions and an opening prayer, chair Austin Swallow shared that the budget writing committee (composed of DS Wendell Brown, district treasurer Patrick Rhoton, and Swallow) were presenting the proposed 2026-27 district budget for this committee's review and approval. He then led the group through the proposal line by line. The allocation of 4.65% of each church's income base has been lowered to 4.50% for 2026-27 as a result of each church's hard work and participation in their fair share. The committee, after reviewing the proposal and asking appropriate questions, approved the budget writing committee's recommendations, and so passed the 2026-27 balanced budget proposal onto the Advisory Board at their May meeting.

The committee then discussed the addition of one policy to the Assembly Finance Committee assembly report related to transition in local church treasurer position. The following statement has been added to the District Policy section: If there is a transition in the local church's treasurer position after at least five years of service to the church by the previous treasurer, it is recommended the church hire an outside representative to conduct a 'look-in' or 'review' audit to ensure all proper accounting practices are being maintained.

Having no further edits to the notes, and no other business brought before the committee, Swallow adjourned the meeting.

We, your committee on finance, submit the following recommendations to the Annual District Assembly and go on record instructing the local churches to comply with the following:

Funding the Mission

The stewardship of the local church is a very sacred responsibility that requires administration. As part of the denominational organization, each local pastor and church embraces their responsibility of supporting the North Central Ohio District, Mount Vernon Nazarene University, and the global church and its missionaries. Just as individuals are instructed in the Word (Malachi 3:8-10) to bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, so should a local church set aside a portion of the tithes and offerings they receive to share with others. Each pastor and congregation should make adequate provision in their yearly budget planning process for their assigned commitment to the district, the university and the general church. The Finance Committee recommends weekly or monthly support.

Each church should remit payment for all funds using the Funding the Mission link, located on the district website www.ncodistrict.org/treasurers or the denominational website www.fundingthemission.org. This interactive website offers a "track giving" tab which has been designed to help local churches monitor their progress towards full payment of their allocations as well as several other features that add value.

Each church, in accordance with the formula set out by the global church shall give at least:

- 5.50% of its income base to the World Evangelism Fund (WEF)
- 2.00% of its income base to Nazarene Benefits
- 2.50% of its income base to Mount Vernon Nazarene University
- 4.50% of its income base to the District Fair Share Fund

This covers all district operations, provides for district ministry support and the three departments (NYI, NMI and NDI).

Notes: Amounts given to WEF and approved mission specials are excluded from the income base and are NOT to be included when calculating total income. Church income is any donation received by the church that qualifies as a charitable contribution. All donations that qualify to appear on a charitable contribution receipt are included in church income. This includes all non-cash donations of \$5,000 or more.

Pastoral Support

A. The support of a pastor is a sacred honor and responsibility of the church board. Manual 32.3 states: **The church is obligated to support its ministers, who have been called of God, and who, under the direction of the church, have given themselves wholly to the work of the ministry.**

- B. As a district, we understand more than 40% of our pastors are considered bi-vocational. As such, we encourage congregations not to demand or even suggest that a person needing to work outside the church to provide for their families commit full-time service to the church. Furthermore, any spousal income should have NO bearing in determining financial compensation for the pastor.
- C. Therefore, we suggest each church board designate a committee (be it the Finance or Personnel Committee or a separate stand-alone committee) to oversee the care of the pastoral family(ies) shepherding their congregation.
- D. As part of the process of calling a new pastor, that a compensation agreement detailing the annual salary, benefits and reimbursements be drafted and signed to avoid misunderstanding by either party prior to the beginning of the relationship. Manual 117.4. Copies should be sent to the district office and entered into the official church board minutes.
- i. The district has provided a compensation worksheet to assist this process, located on the district website www.ncodistrict.org/treasurers.
- E. That annually, the church board reviews all pastoral staff compensation and adjusts in accordance with stated pastoral performance goals for the year and the income of the church. Manual 139.8
- i. When conducting said compensation review, church boards be reminded of the difference between a COLA (cost of living adjustment) and a salary increase. A COLA simply brings a pastoral salary up to last year's level. It is not an increase.
- ii. Employee benefits and reimbursement adjustments are handled differently by the IRS and are not considered salary increases. While appreciated, these adjustments generally have minimal impact on the financial welfare of the pastoral family.
- F. The general church has informative resources that are readily available as well. These may be found at pbusa.org/memos.

Compensation Package

Part 1: Cash Salary

Actual cash salary is but one part of a compensation package for a full-time pastor. Provisions for housing, appropriate benefits, plus reimbursements for applicable business and professional expenses, and providing for retirement equal the entire compensation package which are the church's responsibility.

Above all, we are reminded while there is no one definitive source a church board can look at to determine an equitable compensation for their leaders, we urge local church boards to consider the following resources:

- Our district superintendent
- The Nazarene Benefits office of the general church which has an annual compensation by size and location report posted under the resource tab www.nbusa.org/memos
- Local sources, such as the school board and/or hospital salary scales

Most importantly, the central objective of a church's compensation package should be to allow a pastor to effectively carry out his/her responsibility to the church and to God, both administratively and spiritually while not having to worry about providing for his/her family.

1. With the recent changes in tax law, it is important to remember each church board should attempt to structure compensation packages to help the pastor minimize their annual tax liability.
2. All employees, ministerial or lay, must be provided a W-2 each year which reflects cash salary paid as compensation, any bonus or love offering, social security/Medicare tax allowances and taxable fringe benefits.

Compensation Package

Part 2: Housing Allowance

Whether the local church still maintains a parsonage for their pastor(s) or provides rental or mortgage assistance, the federal tax code (Section 107) contains wording that creates a substantial tax benefit to pastors.

In the case of a minister of the gospel, gross income DOES NOT include:

1. *the rental value of a home furnished to him/her as part of their compensation OR*
2. *the rental allowance paid to him/her as part of their compensation, to the extent used by him/her to rent or provide a home and to the extent such allowance does not exceed the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the utilities and reasonable repair costs.*

Bi-vocational ministers may have a housing allowance, but only from their ministerial income. It can, however, be up to 100% of that compensation. It cannot exceed it.

Each church board must designate this amount in advance (with official action and recorded in the minutes). It is suggested church boards either make this declaration part of the agenda for the first meeting of each calendar year or make the wording open-ended enough upon hire to cover from that point forward.

While excluded from federal income tax, housing allowances must be included for Social Security and Medicare tax purposes (SECA) in those computations. Church treasurers are urged to work with their pastor(s) to ensure compliance with the tax code and reporting. Additional assistance is available from the district finance team and the general church benefits website www.nbusa.org/memos

Compensation Package

Part 3: Benefits

Self-Employment Tax:	(SECA) Most laity do not realize the Social Security rules for pastors are different and each pastor must pay this tax. It is currently 15.3% of reported cash income. Each church should budget for this amount when determining pastoral compensation.
Retirement:	Supporting pastors in retirement requires planning and saving, just like it does for laity. Beginning in 2024, the Nazarene 403(b) retirement benefit program has been substantially improved <i>'in a direct response to the lack of retirement readiness among so many of our active pastors'</i> . We urge all churches to budget annually for their pastor's retirement. Whether you utilize the denominational plan or work with your pastor on an individualized approach, it is important to care for their future while they are your shepherd. Our Manual calls it a 'moral obligation' (117.4).
Health Insurance:	No pastoral family should serve without health (including dental) insurance coverage. With the passage of the Affordable Care Act back in 2010, those who cannot find an available and applicable group policy, may purchase insurance through government-supported plans. The enrollment period is in the fall of each year. In the case of a bi-vocational pastor or a pastor whose spouse has an insurance option available, the church board should work to provide either the monthly premium or applicable spousal contribution amount.
Life and Disability:	If possible, policies are available at relatively low cost and should be considered as part of a compensation package. It is far better to plan ahead rather than have to face the issue of what to do if a pastor passes away or is disabled and unable to serve for an extended period of time.
Death Benefit:	The district provides a \$10,000 benefit to the designated beneficiary on file at the district office for any district lead pastor who passes while serving in that role. Please contact the district office for further details and beneficiary form.
Education:	The Nazarene church has long supported the educational aspirations of their pastors. Indeed, the creation of our Nazarene colleges and universities across the world have benefited our local congregations throughout the years. However, many pastors have significant educational debt and church boards should work to assist in the repayment of that debt AND/OR expenses should the pastor(s) wish to gain further education.
Vacation:	Each local church should provide for annual time away for their pastor(s). Our district recommendation is based on years of ministerial service: 1-5 years in the ministry 2 weeks (including 2 Sundays) 6-10 years in the ministry 3 weeks (including 3 Sundays) 10-15 years in the ministry 4 weeks (including 4 Sundays) over 15 years in the ministry 5 weeks (including 5 Sundays) That any pulpit supply be remunerated by the church. Furthermore, that each church should remember the pastor(s) and their family(ies) at Christmas with at least an additional week's salary.
Sabbatical:	Each church should establish a policy to respond to the need of pastors for withdrawal from the day-to-day rigors of an assignment for scholarly review and personal renewal. This policy should be planned for and included in the annual budgeting process. Within the fifth year of a ministry assignment, the pastor, be they serving in a senior pastorate or staff position, should develop and plan for his/her reflection and renewal. The suggested timing is a minimum of four weeks. It is strongly urged that the pastor's salary continue in full and that the church board provide for pulpit supply during the sabbatical period. The Pastor should present a plan for their sabbatical goals to both their church board and the District Superintendent. A follow-up discussion with "lessons learned" should also be presented to both the local church board and the District Superintendent. (Manual 139.10)
Maternity/Paternity: Leave	A maternity leave of six weeks and/or a paternity leave of two weeks is recommended upon the birth, adoption, or assumption of legal guardianship of a child. We recommend an additional two weeks be granted for a birth by Cesarean section or other birthing complication(s). We recommend pastors receive their full salary and benefits while on such leave. Should a church have either a long-term or temporary disability plan that could be utilized in such a situation, we recommend that such a plan be used to offset the pastor's salary and benefits provided by the church during the maternity and/or paternity leave.

Compensation Package

Part 4: Business and Professional Reimbursements

With the 2017 tax reform, it behooves a pastor and church board to examine their reimbursement agreements. Unless a structure is set up to reimburse the pastor (upon receiving receipts within thirty (30) days and/or detailed documentation as to use, that money MUST be added to the annual W-2 as TAXABLE income to the pastor. The District Finance Committee recommends that each church board formally adopt and record a reimbursement policy to include:

- Provisions for ministry use of an automobile (mileage at IRS standards). If a church provides a vehicle, the pastor must keep track (with detailed odometer readings) of miles used for personal use which includes driving to and from the church from home.
- Business-related entertainment

- Professional books and magazines
- Professional membership dues
- Stationery and stamps for ministry use
- Cell phone
- Educational expenses: to include seminars for ongoing learning (see benefits)

Many of these expenses should be included in your annual budgeting process.

Furthermore, it is recommended each church budget for and pay all expenses for

- the pastoral family to attend district meetings such as district assembly, district family camp, district gatherings, and pastor and spouses' retreats.
- if at all possible, to allow the pastor (and family) to attend the General Assembly by providing for their expenses. Since this global church event is held once every four years, the church board is advised to set aside an amount in their annual budgets to offset these expenses. Time spent attending assemblies or gatherings should NOT be considered part of a pastor's vacation time.

The district has a compensation worksheet available on the district website www.ncodistrict.org/treasurers. It is strongly advised each church board annually use this form, which then should be forwarded to the district superintendent each year.

Local Church Procedures

- A. That a committee of two or more non-related individuals shall count and record all money received by the church. (Manual 129.22)
- B. That the church board arranges for an annual financial review of the treasurer's books and that each church that operates a daycare, elementary or secondary school additionally forward said financial review to the district superintendent within sixty (60) days of the close of the statistical year. (Manual 139.23)
- C. That the treasurer's book be open at all times to the pastor and the district superintendent or their designate.
- D. In no case should a person serve as treasurer of a local church who is not willing to conform to the position(s) of the Manual.
- E. All elected or appointed church officials, with the exemption of the pastor(s), shall serve without remuneration.
- F. That when payment of funds has been approved by the church board, that such payment should be made as expediently as possible and for the purpose(s) designated.
- G. In the handling of all funds for future expansion and development, that such funds be deposited in a separate account and that no withdrawals be made without two signatures.
- H. Each church shall implement a proper screening process for both volunteer and employed persons who work with children and teens as it pertains to sexual and physical abuse (Manual 139.30) including budgeting for appropriate background checks. We further recommend that insurance programs be reviewed periodically in this area.
- I. When calling an evangelist to conduct a meeting at a local church: that their remuneration be twice the weekly salary of the senior pastor, plus SECA expense and one-way travel.
- J. That in the annual budgeting process, a goal of at least 10 percent of all money received be paid to the World Evangelism Fund (WEF) and approved specials with priority being given to WEF.
- K. That the local church financially supports any student attending Mount Vernon Nazarene University with a minimum scholarship of \$1,000.

District Policies and Procedures

- A. It is the local church's responsibility to budget for and pay all general, district, and university allocations. Manual 140. The District Advisory Board will appoint a committee to assist any church unable to pay their annual budgets with setting a balanced budget for the upcoming district year.
- B. When a local church has not paid budgets in full for two (2) consecutive years or has not had at least one (1) conversion by profession of faith, no member of that church's congregation may be entered into nomination for an elected district office/board position. (District Advisory Board 8/2018)
- C. The District Advisory Board has adopted criteria for potentially closing a church per Manual 108. When 3 of the 4 criteria for consideration are present for two years, the church will be considered for closure at the first DAB meeting of the following assembly year. (District Advisory Board 10/2018)
- D. No congregation may undertake a building expansion and/or remodeling project that exceeds 10% of the annual amount raised for all purposes until such proposed expenditures are approved by the District Church Properties Board Manual 236.
- E. A district allocation exemption will be made available to congregations conducting a capital stewardship campaign which has been approved by the District Properties Board. To qualify, a project must equal or exceed the annual income of the church. The exemption will extend for three years and will only apply to giving designated for the approved project.
- F. Any district church or compassionate ministry receiving district support shall apply annually for renewal. Applications are due August 1st of each year with decisions being made to fund at the August District Advisory Board meeting. Successful applicants shall make a report to the following assembly.
- G. Pastors and church boards are reminded that before hiring pastoral staff members and/or during the annual re hiring process, approval of the district superintendent must be obtained per Manual 139.27.

H. When there is a pastoral change at a district church, the District Finance Committee will appoint a representative to conduct a review of the church's financial records, policies and procedures and present a report to the District Superintendent and the District Advisory Board prior to the calling of a new pastor. (District Advisory Board 11/2019)

I. **If there is a transition in the local church's treasurer position after at least five years of service to the church by the previous treasurer, it is recommended the church hire an outside representative to conduct a 'look-in' or 'review' audit to ensure all proper accounting practices are being maintained.**

J. If a district ministry department (NMI, NDI, or NYI) should for any reason overspend its budget in one district year, that same amount will be reduced from the next budget cycle. (District Advisory Board 3/2018)

K. Any district sponsored group travel shall be coordinated through the approved travel agency on file at the district office. No individual arrangements are to be made. (District Advisory Board 8.18)

L. In the event of a merger between two churches, a property transference agreement should be completed, and a copy submitted to the district office. (District Advisory Board 10/2019)

M. Per IRS regulations, any self-employed individual or an unincorporated business receiving \$600 or more from a church or ministry during the calendar year must receive a Form 1099-MISC showing the compensation amount.

N. As part of his/her yearly responsibilities, the District Treasurer will contract with an accredited accounting firm to conduct a certified financial review of the district's finances for the fiscal year. Said review will be completed prior to and included in the printed assembly journal.

O. We recommend each church utilize the Church of the Nazarene Foundation to facilitate planned and deferred gifts from their members to any Nazarene ministry, including gifts to the local church, and to use the foundation to manage investment accounts, endowments or charitable trusts. Information can be found at cnf.NazareneFoundation.org or by calling 866-273-2549.

P. The Assembly Finance Committee Secretary shall be authorized to edit the Assembly Finance Committee Report as needed and appropriate.

IV. Finances

A. That a sub-committee of the Finance Committee be charged with creating a yearly budget to be presented to the full committee for their review and recommendation to the District Advisory Board.

B. That the Advisory Board be authorized, in their discretion, to make proper adjustments in the event of inequity in the application of the Benefits Fund for a deceased minister's family if the local church has not paid their budgets in full.

C. That the Fair Share district budget as recommended by the District Finance Committee and approved by the District Advisory Board is 4.50%.

V. Education

- A. That each church on the district welcomes representatives from Mount Vernon Nazarene University. We urge our churches to cooperate fully in supporting our Nazarene educational institutions, including Nazarene Theological Seminary and Nazarene Bible College by receiving a generous annual offering. We also urge our church attendees to support Mount Vernon Nazarene University by participating in their employer's matching fund program. (For a church's reporting purposes, the personal contribution portion may be applied to the assigned educational budget of the local church, but NOT the matching fund portion.)
- B. That the pastor's continuing education is important. The district has set aside funds to assist pastors who desire to pursue advanced degrees. A set amount will be placed in the yearly budget and distributed until depleted. Applications will be due by June 15th for the following Fall semester and grants awarded following the August District Advisory Board meeting.
- C. It is our desire to help build up a new generation of top talent for the district and the church in general. The district has adopted a policy for supporting such calls. Based on the model of investing in an individual's promise in return for a prescribed period of working to repay the investment, the district will identify such worthy individuals upon a pastor or professor's recommendation and application process. (District Advisory Board 8/2020)
- D. Per agreement with Mount Vernon Nazarene University, all funds given over 85% of the University's allocation in any given year will be directed to the district's endowed scholarships housed within the university's endowment.

How do we put into words what only the Lord can do? This I ponder on a daily basis. While on the same team, we find that God has made us peculiar individuals as well. Does that mean we are not one or not on the same team? Absolutely not. We can and are on the same team with different strengths and weaknesses, all working together for the Lord. So what have we done? We have partnered with two different ministries to accomplish things we could not otherwise do on our own. We partnered with County Seat Reclaimed ministries and hit the streets of Ashtabula with a plan of praying with the homeless or anyone we found. We were able to pray on the streets and in a few businesses. Some wanted to be free of addiction, but some weren't sure they were ready. We prayed with both. It was an uncomfortable kind of ministry yet more impactful than staying inside the church building. We also partnered with Mya's Ministries which helps many young women with a number of things. One of their main focuses is when the women come in and are pregnant they are given a 3d ultrasound which allows the mother to see and hear their baby. Because of this, many babies are born and not aborted.

We here at Cherry Valley decided to have a free community event outside of the church doors. We rented the high school auditorium and worked with God's Comic Ministries to bring Brad Stine for a Christian comedy show. He made us laugh for sure, but he also gave the gospel and presented the question "If Jesus came today would you be ready?". I've never been at a comedy show with an altar call, but that's the way it ended. We didn't have a great outpouring of people storming the platform for prayer, but we had a lot of people that heard the gospel that came to a comedy show not knowing they would hear the gospel too.

To conclude, I can remember so many different folks that we have discipled through our Men's breakfast, Men's Bible sharing and relationship building on Mondays, and Women's Monday morning and evening study and relationship building. Of course one of our largest ministries in the summer is our Car Cruise-In where we have found that ministry can be fun, yet still relational. With so many different ministries in the church we have had to realize we are on the same team, Team Jesus!

Report to the Assembly: *How is your church helping individuals take their next steps toward holiness? (2 Corinthians 7:1)*

Over the past year, one of the goals of our church has been to become intentional about helping people take their next steps in discipleship as they grow in Christlikeness. Spiritual formation is not accidental. As we have prayed, planned, and become more intentional in discipleship, we have seen God at work in the lives of people of all ages, drawing them toward faithfulness, spiritual maturity, and holiness.

In the fall, we launched MomCo, creating a space where mothers could gather for encouragement and authentic relationships. We have watched women build meaningful connections with one another while growing deeper in their relationship with Christ. During October and November, we also celebrated one of the most visible fruits of discipleship as 13 individuals were baptized. We have followed these professions of faith with more intentional one-on-one mentorship opportunities, helping new believers establish a strong spiritual foundation.

One significant area of focus has been equipping volunteers to view their roles as disciplemakers rather than simply filling ministry positions. Through intentional volunteer training, we have emphasized that every interaction, whether serving children, students, guests, or adults, is an opportunity to influence someone’s spiritual journey.

As the year has progressed, we have become more focused on creating a clear discipleship pathway for those who call our church home. Our discipleship team has evaluated and strengthened existing classes and opportunities, seeking to ensure that people could clearly identify their next step, whether they were exploring faith, growing in biblical knowledge or serving in ministry.

In the spring, we relaunched our young adult ministry and began a Spanish Bible study. We have been encouraged by the response to both ministries and grateful to see our church family grow in diversity while strengthening relationships across generations.

We also held two youth-led worship services, which served as powerful reminders that discipleship is not limited by age. It has been a joy to watch our students use their gifts to lead and serve.

We have new Wednesday night ministries and have begun offering New Friends Luncheons. These gatherings have provided important entry points for people seeking connection, community, and growth. We continue to see individuals move from being visitors to becoming engaged participants in the life of the church.

As we reflect on this season, God is helping us cultivate a culture of discipleship where people are known, encouraged, equipped, and challenged to take their next steps with Jesus.

Ministry Focus: Pursuing Holiness Together

Throughout this year, our church has remained committed to the biblical call to sanctification and spiritual growth. We have witnessed a growing hunger for God's presence, a deeper reverence for His Word, and a renewed commitment among believers to pursue lives that honor Christ.

Through preaching, discipleship, Bible studies, and intentional pastoral care, the Holy Spirit has continued to transform lives and draw people into a closer relationship with God. A sermon series focused on building our lives as an altar of holiness before the Lord has particularly impacted our congregation, producing visible fruit in the areas of repentance, spiritual maturity, and personal devotion.

Several recurring testimonies from both new and existing members can be summarized in three simple statements:

"I feel safe," "I have learned so much," and "God's Word has confronted me in my sin."

These testimonies reflect the spiritual environment God is cultivating within our church family.

Life Transformation Through Community and Care:

One of the most encouraging testimonies this year comes from a young woman who experienced a life-threatening medical emergency following surgery. When her family reached out to the church for prayer, members immediately mobilized in intercession on her behalf.

By God's grace, she recovered and later shared how deeply impacted she was by both the prayers and the support she received from the church community. Since then, she has continued growing in her faith through Bible studies, discipleship, and meaningful relationships within the congregation.

She frequently expresses gratitude for finding a church family where she feels spiritually safe, loved, and encouraged. Even more encouraging, her husband recently surrendered his life to Christ and has begun witnessing the transformative work of the Holy Spirit within his own family.

This testimony serves as a powerful reminder that ministry extends beyond the walls of the church and into the everyday challenges people face.

Spiritual Growth Through Biblical Teaching:

Another significant testimony comes from a man who has faithfully attended church with his wife for nearly a year.

Coming from a religious background where biblical teaching was not always clearly understood, he shared that he has gained more practical understanding of Scripture during his time with our church than at any previous point in his spiritual journey.

Through consistent exposure to God's Word, he has experienced genuine conviction and transformation. He has made significant life changes, including overcoming long-standing habits, while developing a growing understanding of God's love, grace, and desire to sanctify His people.

Both he and his wife report increased consistency in prayer, personal Bible study, and spiritual disciplines. Their testimony highlights the importance of clear biblical teaching and intentional discipleship in fostering lasting spiritual growth.

Report to the Assembly: How is your church helping individuals take their next steps toward holiness? (2 Corinthians 7:1)

As Nueva Luz continues to strive for holiness, church members have been called to revisit Wesleyan Heritage with the focus on three fundamental beliefs: Salvation, Justification, and Sanctification. Church members and newcomers were reminded that salvation is not simply about going to heaven. By salvation, we mean more than the promise of eternal life, but a present deliverance from sin, a restoration of the soul to its original purity, a recovery of the divine nature in righteousness and true holiness, in justice, mercy, and truth. Salvation encompasses the whole ongoing work of God. It began the hour I first believed and is a process that continues until mortal life shall cease. We are renewed in God's image and empowered by the Holy Spirit to love and serve God and neighbor in true holiness and righteousness all the remaining days of our lives. God's work of salvation is ultimately brought to completion when we stand in eternity in the presence of God and the company of all the redeemed. But it involves both justification and sanctification. By justification we are saved from the guilt of sin and restored to the favor of God. By sanctification we are saved from the power and the root of sin and restored to the image of God. The good news is that God has taken the initiative to make a way forward for us where we could not make headway on our own. First, in reaching out to us in reconciling love in the person of the Son. Secondly, in gifting us with the Holy Spirit to guide us into and empower us for living righteous and holy lives pleasing to God.

So, "Therefore, since we have these promises, dear friends, let us purify ourselves from everything that contaminates body and spirit, perfecting holiness out of reverence for God". 2 Corinthians 7:1

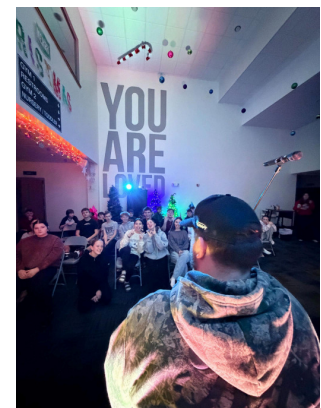
This collective sprint toward discipleship catalyzed three incredible highlights this past year:

She is building a brand-new, holy foundation for her family, and her daughter is even attending NCO teen camp this summer!

We are living out Hebrews 10:24, "Let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds." We are on the same team, chasing holiness, and the best is yet to come!

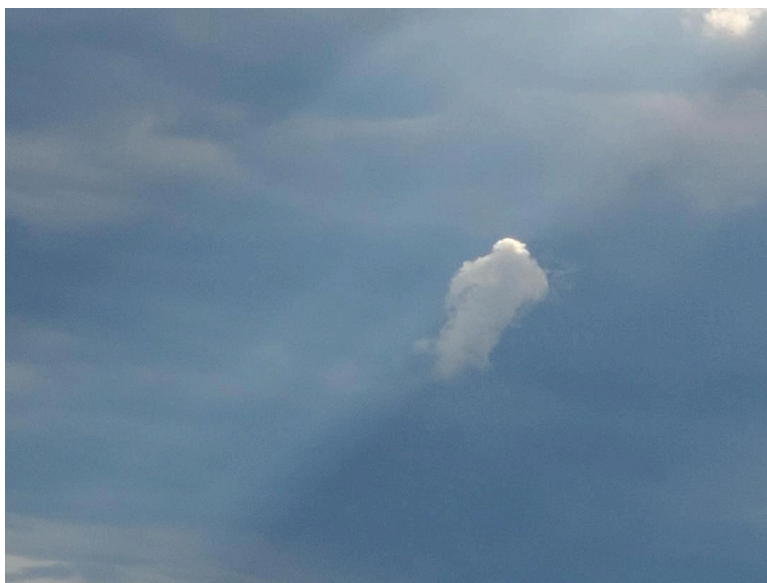

Report to the Assembly: How is your church helping individuals take their next steps toward holiness? (2 Corinthians 7:1)

This has been a year of return for the Galion Church of the Nazarene — return to identity, return to prayer, and return to the kind of faithful, ordinary discipleship that has always been the heartbeat of our movement.

Under a one-year appointment from District Superintendent Rev. Wendell Brown, Pastor Jason Wilson began serving as lead pastor in the late spring of 2025. Together with the board, we retired our previous identity as "Real Life" and stepped forward again, plainly and proudly, as the Galion Church of the Nazarene. New signage (with the District Office's gracious support), a new logo by Will Bowin, and a new church email all reflect that return. We are on the same team — "let us purify ourselves from everything that contaminates body and spirit, perfecting holiness out of reverence for God" (2 Corinthians 7:1) — same team with our District, our denomination, and our community. A new vision has taken shape around three words: Prayer, Passion, Purpose. On February 11, 2026, we launched a Midweek Prayer Gathering and Bible Study, now averaging seven faithful attenders. Prayer is no longer one program among many — it is becoming the rhythm we plan around.

The year held quiet faithfulness and real joy. We welcomed a new family into membership and blessed two beloved members as they transferred to a sister Nazarene congregation in Willard. We hosted a Gingerbread House Building event, a Family Dinner, a Valentine's Day children's celebration, a March Nerf event, a Good Friday service, and our first Alabaster Offering as a renewed congregation. We hosted missionaries Cosmas and Andronica Mutowa from South Africa. Our children's church now runs three weeks a month, with each child receiving a kid-sized version of Sunday's sermon. A seven-member security team keeps a Sunday rotation. Finally, quiet improvements — furnace servicing, a refreshed ProPresenter setup, a stronger livestream — keep our building serving the community.

By the numbers: Sunday worship averages 34 to 42, the livestream draws about 26 weekly views, and December income outpaced the prior December. We finished the year ahead of where we started.

Looking ahead: deepening prayer, restarting men's ministry, pursuing an MVNU worship intern, growing our children's ministry, and walking through Pastor Jason's appointment review with the District.

Same team (2 Corinthians 7:1). Prayer, passion, purpose. By God's grace, Galion continues as we go.

We greet people warmly, the music & teaching is anointed and we linger in fellowship in the sanctuary making sure people connect among themselves. We have noticed that some of our folks live in vulnerable situations and have socio-economic challenges so we like to elongate the church experience and provide a place for peace and joy. Every first Sunday, all of our people also know that this is the Sunday when we grow together by partaking in Holy Communion and eating our Agape Meal.

In some cases, individuals might have come because of the advertised meal but after years of attending, these folks still continue to attend because this is home and those around them are their brothers and sisters. I know for a fact that some of these wonderful folks can no longer drive and people in this fellowship pick them up to buy groceries and go to church together. It is great for me to testify that the fellowship that has developed among the Garfield Nazarenes is not Christian consumerism or prosperity but is a therapeutic alliance that creates accountability and holds people to higher spiritual standards. Report to the Assembly: *How is your church helping individuals take their next steps toward holiness? (2 Corinthians 7:1)*

As a young church plant, this past year focused on strengthening the foundations necessary for healthy discipleship and sustainable growth. Our primary objective was to establish and refine the structures, systems, and processes that support effective communication, accountability, and ministry development. These efforts have helped create an environment where people can take meaningful next steps in their relationship with Christ through biblical community, prayer, worship, and service.

A significant development was the hiring of a part-time Office Administrator. This addition greatly improved the coordination of day-to-day ministry operations, allowing me to devote more time to shepherding, discipleship, and equipping leaders for ministry.

Throughout the year, we continued to emphasize spiritual formation through corporate worship, Bible study, prayer, and relational discipleship. Members were encouraged to grow in their understanding of Scripture, serve one another, and cultivate Christ-centered relationships that foster accountability and spiritual maturity.

One of the highlights of the year was celebrating eight individuals who publicly declared their faith in Christ through baptism. Their inspiring testimonies and enthusiasm for the Lord encouraged our entire church family. We are also excited that several others have already committed to participating in our next baptism celebration.

Several new ministries were launched to support discipleship across different stages of life. Our Moms in Prayer Ministry began meeting monthly to provide encouragement, fellowship, and focused prayer for families. We also established a Seniors Ministry, creating opportunities for older adults to build meaningful relationships, receive spiritual support, and remain actively engaged in church life.

Additional opportunities for growth were provided through Wednesday Night Bible Studies, which offered consistent biblical teaching and discussion. The series concluded with a seminar titled The Process of Calling and Separation for Ministry, helping participants explore biblical principles related to calling, preparation, faithful service, and unity within the body of Christ.

Intentional ministry training and mentoring continued throughout the year for individuals sensing a call to ministry. Through discipleship, theological instruction, and hands-on ministry experience, emerging leaders were challenged to grow in biblical knowledge, spiritual maturity, and ministry effectiveness.

Another significant milestone was the completion of our church website which is scheduled for publication in late June. Looking ahead, we are excited to expand our outreach through digital platforms and social media, using these tools to connect with our community, share the gospel, and provide resources for discipleship.

We thank the Lord for all He has done and all He will do throughout our second year. To Him be the glory!

Jefferson Nazarene is a church that lives out a simple but powerful truth: we are on the **same team** for the kingdom. From community outreach to compassionate care, each ministry shows that the mission is bigger than any one event, ministry leader, or volunteer role. Jefferson Nazarene’s purpose is to help people discover Jesus, grow as disciples, and deploy together to make a difference.

Kingdom teamwork

That shared mission becomes visible in ministries like Night to Shine, which celebrates and honors people with special needs through a prom-style experience centered on God’s love. It is also seen in the Amazing Grace 5K, a race that raises funds for local ministries through bringing people together around fellowship, fitness, and purpose. These events are not just activities; they are kingdom moments where we work side by side with other churches for one goal: reflecting Christ to others.

Compassion in action

The heart of Jefferson Nazarene is not competition between ministries, but cooperation for Christ’s mission. Night to Shine, Amazing Grace 5K, Produce Pickup, Beds to Bags, Bags of Hope, and many other efforts all point in the same direction: loving people well and making Jesus known. That is what it means to be on the same team for the kingdom—different assignments, one Lord, one gospel mission, one church. On Mission together to help the hurting find true hope in CHRIST!

Marion Life Link believes that growth happens best in community, so the thread of building and maintaining relationships is woven through everything we do. Whether it's being the place where everybody knows your name - rides to medical appointments - groceries delivered - in-person tech support - sharing a washer & dryer with apartment dwellers - cards of encouragement - calls to check-in - texting links for songs/scriptures that speak to a known situation – worshipping together – praying for each other – joining in communion together – studying the Word, this is a congregation of people on the same team.

With the poverty rate in Marion County over 16% and 19% of our county's kids living in a household lacking consistent access to adequate food, our Hines Market Food Pantry is an essential means for us to build relationships with our community. This year allowed us to provide over 34,000 meals to our neighbors. Especially exciting to see is when those who have been served return to serve others, choose to move into relationship with Jesus, and participate in corporate worship and spiritual practices. We currently have an individual working through the membership process, to join the team, who we met initially as a client to this ministry.

Encouraging and modeling participation in the disciplines of personal and corporate prayer, scripture reading, and living in rhythm with the liturgical calendar has been a multi-year commitment. It continues to produce ever deepening roots and a sturdy faith that withstands life's storms. In the midst of a culture deeply divided, much economic uncertainty, hard diagnoses, and challenging family situations, it is inspiring to watch team members extend forgiveness before apologies are offered, give faithfully, generously, cheerfully, and sacrificially, serve in hard and thankless areas, celebrate and encourage each other in wins and losses, and give testimony of God's transforming work in their lives. One of our regular attendees, active in our recovery ministry, was helping with custodial tasks and ran across a left-over book from our Lenten Bible Study. He commented to another volunteer on how significant those studies have been for his growth over the past 5 years. Last week he asked to begin the membership process and officially join the team. He testifies that after a number of years of ups and downs in his Christian walk, he has surrendered fully to a deeper work of grace and knows his heart is changed.

Report to the Assembly: How is your church helping individuals take their next steps toward holiness? (2 Corinthians 7:1)

Fresh Faith Community Church has been leaning into this year’s theme, “Same Team,” by focusing on how we help people take their next steps in discipleship together. Over the past year, we have begun rolling out a clearer discipleship pathway built around four simple movements: Gather, Grow, Give, and Go. Our desire is not simply to add programs, but to help people understand that following Jesus is a lifelong journey of being formed into His likeness through the grace of God, the work of the Holy Spirit, and the life of the church.

One highlight from this year has been the introduction of this discipleship pathway as a simple and memorable way to help people identify their next step with Jesus. Gather reminds us that we are called into worship and community. Grow points us toward spiritual maturity, holiness, and Christlike transformation. Give encourages every person to use their gifts in service to God and others. Go reminds us that disciples are sent into everyday life to share the hope of Christ. This pathway has begun shaping our preaching, leadership conversations, ministry planning, and the way we invite people to engage more intentionally in the life and mission of the church.

A second major highlight has been the establishment of a new church work at Hidden Lakes called Campfire Community. Campfire Community was formed in partnership with another local congregation with the mission of “Seeking wholeness and community through Christ.” This new work is allowing us to reach people in a setting outside the walls of our church building, especially those who may not yet feel connected to a traditional church environment. Through worship, relationships, prayer, and intentional presence, Campfire Community is creating space for people to encounter Jesus, experience Christian community, and begin taking meaningful steps toward healing, faith, and discipleship.

We are grateful for the ways God is helping Fresh Faith Community take steps toward renewed mission and deeper discipleship. We believe the Lord is reminding us that we are truly on the same team—serving one Christ, pursuing one mission, and helping one another become holy people who know, love, and share Jesus.

Report to the Assembly: How is your church helping individuals take their next steps toward holiness? (2 Corinthians 7:1)

Over this church year, our theme has been “Same Team,” and we have witnessed God working powerfully through every ministry of our church as we unite around one mission — making Christlike disciples and helping people take their next steps toward holiness and sanctification. We remain deeply grateful for the many faithful volunteers, leaders, and staff members who continue serving together to build the Kingdom of God.

One of the clearest ways we are seeing discipleship take place is through life transformation. This Easter season alone, we celebrated 19 baptisms. Throughout this church year, we have celebrated 42 baptisms total. Nearly every month, we are seeing people surrender their lives to Christ, publicly declare their faith, and begin growing in their walk with Jesus. We are witnessing marriages restored, addictions overcome, and hurting people finding healing and hope through Christ.

A second highlight has been the growth of our children’s and youth ministries. Our children’s ministry has seen significant attendance growth, with many new families becoming connected through our Upward sports ministry. One family that first attended through Upward recently experienced a complete life transformation — both parents accepted Christ, were baptized, and dedicated their children to the Lord. In our youth ministry, dozens of teenagers have begun attending regularly, many making decisions for Christ and being baptized. Several entire families are now attending because their teenagers first connected through the youth ministry.

A third highlight has been our continued outreach to the community through the Foster Ministry Center. Through weekly hot meals and our backpack ministry partnership with local schools - Danville and East Knox schools, we are meeting practical needs while demonstrating the love of Jesus in tangible ways.

At First Church, we continue to believe that every number represents a person and every person has a story. This year our worship attendance is up, we launched more small groups, celebrated a team appreciation night, and saw a 13% increase in giving. What a great year. We know there is more to come. This coming year, we are prayerfully planning the launch of our Lexington Campus, adding a 3rd service to accommodate growth in attendance, starting a Celebrate Recovery service, and launching a daycare. We praise God for all He is doing and look forward with expectation to the year ahead.

Report to the Assembly: *How is your church helping individuals take their next steps toward holiness? (2 Corinthians 7:1)*

At Pentecost, the disciples gathered together in prayer and expectation, waiting for the promise of the Holy Spirit. And when the Spirit came, He brought people from every background together into one body, one family, and one mission. Later, Peter declared in Acts 15:8-9 that God “made no distinction between us and them, purifying their hearts by faith.” That scripture reminds us the Church was never meant to be divided into separate groups or generations doing their own thing. We are on the same team, helping people find their place in the story of God.

That has really been the heart behind discipleship at Lakeholm this year.

Through our “Made for More” preaching emphasis, we have reminded people that salvation is not simply about escaping sin or just “getting by” spiritually. God has called us to holiness, deeper surrender, and becoming the people He created us to be. Week after week, through the preaching of the Word, we have encouraged believers to pursue Christlike character and Spirit-filled living. Holiness is not reserved for a few spiritually mature Christians; it is God’s invitation to all of us as we walk together in faith.

We also see discipleship happening intentionally through our LSM youth discipleship ministry and our children’s ministries. In classrooms, camps, small groups, and everyday conversations, young people are learning that following Jesus means more than attending church. It means learning to pray, study Scripture, serve others, and faithfully live for Christ each day. None of that happens by accident. It takes pastors, teachers, parents, volunteers, and church members all working together on the same team to help guide the next generation toward Christ.

At the same time, God continues to bring new people into our church family. Through Discipleship 101, new believers are learning the foundations of the Christian faith and discovering what it means to follow Jesus day by day. One of the greatest joys this year has been seeing people baptized and watching them begin to grow as followers of Christ. Those moments remind us why discipleship matters.

Discipleship is not just another church program; it is the mission of the Church. Together, empowered by the same Holy Spirit who came at Pentecost, we continue serving on the same team here at Lakeholm and across our NCO District helping people discover God’s grace, grow in holiness, and find their place in His story.

Below are just A FEW of the many great things that God is doing through the ministry of New Life Church. Every week 130+ kids are part of Kid Life ministries between Sundays and Wednesdays. 45 kids accepted Jesus as Savior in 2025! Also, multiple families shared with us that they haven't been able to attend church before because their child has significant needs. Our Buddies team stepped in and each of those families now regularly attend celebration services. Kids are growing in their faith, digging into God's word and finding hope in Jesus. Every single week! Life Groups, families, and other groups of people have chosen to say yes to committing to serve our bus riders dinner on Wednesday nights. Oh, and we have 20-30 bus kids with little to no church connection who attend Kid Life every Wednesday.



Middle School students have regularly sought to be like Jesus through our monthly nights of serving...they have cared for the elderly, homeless, widows, teachers, their peers and community. We started a Middle School program on Sunday mornings (JAM: Jesus And Me) for students to build a foundation for growing in Christ, while still gathering and celebrating with the larger church family.

HS Life has experienced great God moments this year. Summer camps, Winter Wave, Glow Nights, Prayer nights, Tuesday Hangouts, McDonalds runs, etc. Our leadership team has more than doubled in the last year. Our HS attendance has grown over 50% from this time last year. Also, we took 77 MS/HS students and leaders on our winter retreat for a powerful weekend of seeking Jesus.



God is blessing the All Out Sports ministry we lead in the community. Over the course of this past volleyball season alone, 37 girls made the decision to follow Jesus. A record 70 players completed the P3 devotional program, meaning the Gospel was going home with families every single week. Spring Soccer is now underway with 285 registered players, the highest number ever.

A parenting group wrapped up this spring with roughly 35 parents participating, exploring what it looks like to be the most important influence in their child's life. This is "Hope for Generations" happening in real time.

Senior Life (empty nesters and up) is off to a great start. Their first event brought together 41 people. It is wonderful to see this community growing and feeling valued.



And yes, folks continue to be saved, baptized, fully surrendered and discipled throughout the year. All glory goes to God!

SOUL (Signs of Unconditional Love) Church launched September 7th, 2025. This ministry aims to provide accessibility to the Gospel for Deaf and Hard of Hearing individuals and their families. This last year we saw the addition of an interpreter, Rachel Quinn, to the ministry. She has been an invaluable asset. Rachel and her husband recently bought a home in Michigan and are moving. We will miss them dearly, but know that God will provide for them and for our ministry, too. In the months ahead we will be seeking out additional sign support in the ministry.



We have had engagement online from Deaf and Hard of Hearing individuals, and Pastor Kassandra has continued to make contacts both on the district and field levels to develop and encourage accessibility across ministries and platforms on the East Central Field. The reach has been beyond Deaf and Hard of Hearing individuals.

Several months ago, a woman began attending because she wanted language immersion and modeling as she is learning ASL for a co-worker. She heard we had interpreted services from a member of our church. She began coming for language exposure but is now hearing the Gospel preached and engaging more in our worship time.

Currently, Kassandra is working on a video project for discipleship materials to be launched as an online and in-person Sunday School class in the fall. We are looking forward to beginning quarterly gatherings with our Deaf individuals across the district in the months ahead, starting with district assembly. It is a privilege to serve the Lord and His people. Though this particular ministry presents challenges to in-person outreach, we believe the Lord has equipped and called for such a time as this. As we continue to get off the ground, we need and appreciate faithful prayers from God's people. This community is largely unreached for the Gospel due to accessibility barriers in communication. The need is great, but the grace is greater as we look ahead.

This past year has been full—and not just busy, but meaningful.



From June 2025 to June 2026, we’ve seen God move in ways that are both visible and deeply personal. There has been a clear sense of unity around who we are and what we’re called to do. We’ve leaned into the idea that we are on the same team—and that has changed how we show up for one another and for our community.

When SNAP benefits were suspended, our church didn’t hesitate. We stepped in and began providing weekly community meals. What could have been a gap became an opportunity for presence, care, and consistency. We didn’t just meet a need—we built relationships.

We also leaned into mental health in a meaningful way. We hosted several conferences, including Blue Wednesday. These moments created space for honest conversations, healing, and connection—meeting people right where they are.



This year, we received 13 new members by profession of faith—the largest number in our church’s history. That’s not just a number. That’s 13 lives changed. 13 stories of surrender. 13 reminders that God is still drawing people to Himself.

Our outreach continued to expand as we collected and distributed more Thanksgiving boxes than ever before. Once again, our church showed that generosity is not just something we talk about—it’s who we are.



We also made meaningful improvements to our space. Through volunteer effort and generosity, much of the interior of the church was painted, the landscaping had vast upgrades, and the basement was remodeled—creating a more welcoming, functional environment for ministry and connection.

Inside our walls, worship has been marked by authenticity and hunger. People are taking real steps—serving, giving, growing, and leading. There is momentum, not because everything has been easy, but because we’ve chosen to move forward together. Through it all—meals served, tears shed, prayers prayed, and lives changed—one thing has remained clear:

We are on the same team and God is not finished with us yet.

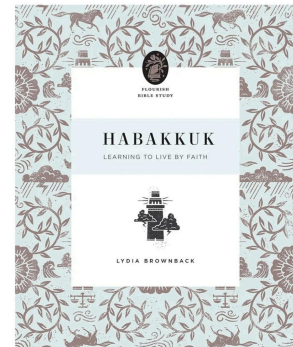

Over the past year, our ministry has sought to strengthen discipleship, clarify mission, and create meaningful pathways for spiritual growth while continuing to move forward together as members of the **Same Team**.

One significant area of focus was discipleship development. We introduced a three-part class pathway designed to help people engage faith at every stage of their journey. The first class provides an accessible environment for individuals taking their first steps of faith. The second helps believers grow deeper through learning and understanding our Articles of Faith. The third invites participants into a richer understanding of the call to holiness and sanctification. Alongside these additions, we re-worked our overall class offerings to better meet the current needs, schedules, and spiritual questions of our Faith Family. Our preaching ministry also emphasized foundational themes that shape who we are and how we live. Through sermon series focused on **Mission** and **Stewardship**, our church family was challenged to consider both our calling as followers of Christ and our responsibility to faithfully manage the resources, opportunities, and influence God has entrusted to us.

Two ministry highlights particularly stand out from this past year. First, thirteen members of our congregation participated in a short-term mission trip to ARO—Southern Ohio. While the trip itself was impactful, its influence reached beyond the mission field. It sparked a renewed passion for local outreach and inspired an important question within our church family: *“What would it look like for SCCN to be in your corner and love you well?”* That question will shape our mission in the new church year as we seek practical, relational ways to engage and serve our community.

Second, we launched a fundraising campaign to facilitate much-needed building updates. This effort was not simply about facilities, but about stewarding our space in a way that better supports ministry, hospitality, and future opportunities for outreach and discipleship.

As we reflect on the past year, we are grateful for God’s faithfulness and for the willingness of our church family to grow, serve, and invest together.

Through discipleship, mission, stewardship, outreach, and vision for the future, we continue moving forward as the **Same Team**, united in purpose and committed to helping people know Christ and grow in Him.

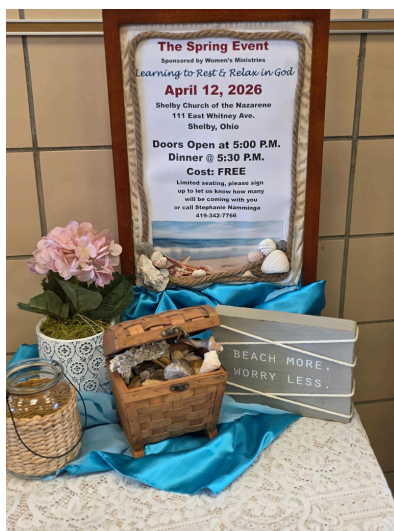
So, Jen came and during the message heard God speaking to her heart that He was who she needed in her life to guide her with all of life's decisions.

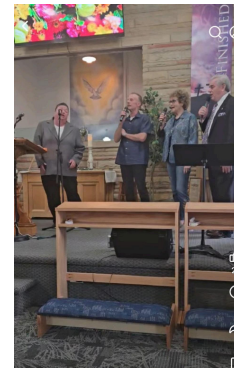

We also had Treva, a 97-year-old mother of a new attendee. She had become blind in the past 3 years. She had a bitter relationship with her son. Now, he had to come live with her to provide required care. We began praying for Treva. At a visit with her, she prayed. When I asked her if she had received Jesus as Savior she replied yes. Twenty minutes after my last visit and prayer she slipped into Heaven.

We are snatching souls from the gates of hell.

The personal walks of our people are growing deeper and more solid. You can see the level of joy increasing in their lives. God is moving at Sullivan.

The great evangelist Charles Finney came to our area in 1833. Our congregation started in 1838. I suspect that we are a result of the Finney revivals in that era. God's work does not return void.

This year at Freedom Church, on top of our “WHO’S YOUR ONE” theme with the district, our local church focus has been “Go For It”—stepping out in faith to pursue what God is putting in front of us and not allowing overthinking or hesitation to keep us from obedience. As we move forward together on the “Same Team,” we are seeing people take intentional next steps in discipleship, growing toward lives marked by holiness and full surrender to Jesus.

One of the clearest examples of this has been the launch of PODS (People Observing Discipleship Studies). While still in the early stages, these groups are already bearing meaningful fruit. In my own group with several young men, the level of openness, honesty, and vulnerability has been incredible. As we walk through accountability questions together, there is a strong and growing desire to live fully surrendered lives of integrity and purity. It’s been encouraging to see men challenge and support one another and pursue Jesus more seriously. The Freedom Fuel graphic is a fun way to talk about the mid-week “warm up” when meeting in these smaller groups.

Another highlight was our first Freedom Church Women’s Brunch, where 47 women gathered for a morning of connection, laughter, and encouragement. Our guest speaker was the one and only Kirsten Umphryes from our Cardington Church, and she absolutely crushed it! She shared a powerful message about finding hope in Jesus even when life doesn’t go as planned. As she spoke about navigating Chris’ health battle, while raising a toddler and co-pastoring, there wasn’t a dry eye in the room. Many women who do not attend our church were present—seeds were planted—and those who came left feeling deeply encouraged, valued, and reminded that Jesus never leaves their side.

Finally, we have continued to “go for it” in clearly presenting the Gospel in nearly every service, operating with the mindset: “don’t assume everyone knows Jesus.” We invite people to accept Christ, to return to Him, or fully surrender their lives to Him and to live on mission. On Easter Sunday, after this invitation where many hands were raised, we challenged those who responded to take a bold step forward—and six people came forward publicly. It was a powerful and humbling moment that reflected hearts ready to follow Jesus wholeheartedly.

We are so grateful to be part of what God is doing and excited to continue stepping out in faith as we help people take their next steps toward fully following Jesus.

This past year at Wadsworth Nazarene has been a year of celebration, growth, and seeing Jesus move in powerful ways. As the church has celebrated 100 years of ministry, the focus was not just on remembering the past, but also on recognizing what God is doing right now. This year reminded us that Wadsworth Nazarene is not finished. Jesus is still changing lives, bringing families, and preparing the church for a fresh work.

One of the biggest steps this year was launching Drive-Thru Prayer. From May through October, the church prayed with 84 people, and six families visited because of that ministry. T.O.W.N. events also helped the church connect with the community in a new way. What started with around 50 people grew to 200 people at the final event. That is something worth celebrating. The church also saw new ministries and discipleship opportunities begin. J21 Young Adults gave young adults a place to gather and grow. "The Walk" brought men and women together for discipleship through the summer. Children and youth were poured into through VBS, quizzing, and faithful leaders who gave their time and love. VBS averaged around 30 kids each night, and in August, 13 people were baptized. That is not just activity — that is life change.

This year also brought new ways to reach people. The church website was built and now connects the church's online presence, averaging around 300 views a month to the website. Wadsworth Nazarene joined the Chamber of Commerce, and through a simple podcast interview, a family began attending the church. The church also launched Pastor Unpacked, a podcast designed to help people get a glimpse of the heart and mission of Wadsworth Nazarene.

Last year, the average Sunday morning attendance was 70. This year, the average grew to 82, with at least 20 new people becoming part of the church family. We have 110 people coming through the doors. People are coming because the church is expecting Jesus to move. People are inviting because they believe Jesus is doing something.

This past year was a foundation year. It was a celebration year. And now, Wadsworth Nazarene is being called to raise the standard and believe Jesus for even more.

Report to the Assembly: How is your church helping individuals take their next steps toward holiness? (2 Corinthians 7:1)

Some time ago, we developed a “Vision Frame” that consists of four sides: mission, values, strategy, and measures. Our mission statement is “Loving God, Loving People, and Living Transformed.” “Living Transformed” is the daily reality of a fully surrendered and holy life. On our spiritual growth journey, there’s always ... “more to come!” We never arrive until we draw our first breath in heaven!

At Wooster Naz, we believe and teach that a fully surrendered holy life is evidenced when we choose to genuinely pray, declare, and live out these heart-piercing and convicting words of Jesus: “Father, bring glory to your name!” [John 12:28a] This is a free-will sacrifice that always honors Him!

We are to live out this life-calling in community, not in isolation, “Team Wooster.” Loving God and loving people becomes a private and public daily reality of belonging, believing, and becoming. We call this “palms up living” ... a permanent posture of receiving and giving.

A holy life is an exclusive and inclusive invitation to all followers of Jesus. We keep this in mind in all we do. In our regular worship gatherings, the theme of completely surrendering hearts and lives to Jesus is regularly included and emphasized in worship, testimonies, exhortation, preaching, and in altar invitations. Holiness is also emphasized regularly in our children, youth, and young adult ministries.

We recently finished a series on The Apostles’ Creed: “I Believe,” and 1,2,3 John: “Living Well.” Living holy lives empowered by the Holy Spirit was a heavy emphasis in both of these. We say “Yes!” and surrender in a moment ... and for a lifetime.

Our Vision Frame Measures are: Gathering, Growing, Giving, Going, and Genuine. We consider these to be markers of fully surrendered lives. This is what “Living Transformed” looks like!

A key to living a holy life marked by spiritual growth is to get God’s Word “in you!” It’s powerful, life-changing, and life-giving. We often say ... “Get God’s Word in you “for good” ... as in positive ... and “for good” as in permanent.”

Our GrowTRACK next steps at Wooster Naz include classes and events like: My Start, BASICS, baptism celebrations, Bible studies and gatherings for men and women, NazGROUPS, Pray Now Groups, ALPHA, and Celebrate Recovery. All of these serve to move people more deeply towards and into ... “Loving God,” “Loving people,” and “Living Transformed.”

All counseling services are provided anonymously. The district simply receives an invoice for Jane or John Doe. This map shows the various locations. Contact information is included on the reverse side.

We serve a great God and I'm thankful for His call in your life. Our paths are often filled with bumps and potholes that even our most intense times of personal prayer and reflection are not enough. It is my desire and that of the Advisory Board that this additional resource will help to heal and equip your spirit, your marriage and your family.

1099 required for payments over \$600

Churches/District should issue an IRS Form 1099 for any payment of \$600 or more in a year as a gift, stipend for volunteer services, honorarium, etc. to an individual (not a corporation). If an IRS Form W-9 Request for Taxpayer Identification Number and Certification is not already on file, the taxpayer will need to complete the form before a check is issued to the taxpayer.

Group Travel Guidelines

Any district sponsored group travel shall be coordinated through the approved travel agency on file at the district office. No individual arrangements are to be made. (District Advisory Board 8/25/2018) Group Travel should be used for all group trips for all ministry departments on our district both domestic and international. member of that church's congregation may be entered into nomination for district advisory board or ministry department chair. (District Advisory Board 8/2018)

Best Financial Practices for District Ministry Departments/Reimbursement/Check Requests/Budget/Large Purchases

District Ministry Department Budgets

If a district ministry department (Children's, NMI, NDI or NYI) should for any reason over spend it's budget in one district year, that same amount will be reduced from the next budget cycle. (District Advisory Board 3/2018)

Mandatory Financial Review for Church in Transition

When there is a pastoral change at a district church, the District Finance Committee will appoint a representative to conduct a review of the church's financial records, policies and procedures and present a report to the District Superintendent and the District Advisory Board prior to the calling of a new pastor. (District Advisory Board 11/2019)

Property Transfer Agreement

As a district we uphold the idea that we are "Better Together". As such, when a larger church assumes the ministerial work at a smaller congregation's location; whether that work will be conducted through a merger or closing of the smaller congregation; the larger church would inherit the asset of the smaller churches property at a rate of 20% per year for 5 years. At the end of 5 years, the property will be considered 100% the asset of the church and would be free to be used in a manner that blesses the congregation, even if that includes liquidating the property for the betterment of their financial picture. (District Finance Committee 7/31/2019)

(necessary for permission to sell church property, build/remodel, purchase property, borrow money, change church name, establish a line of credit)

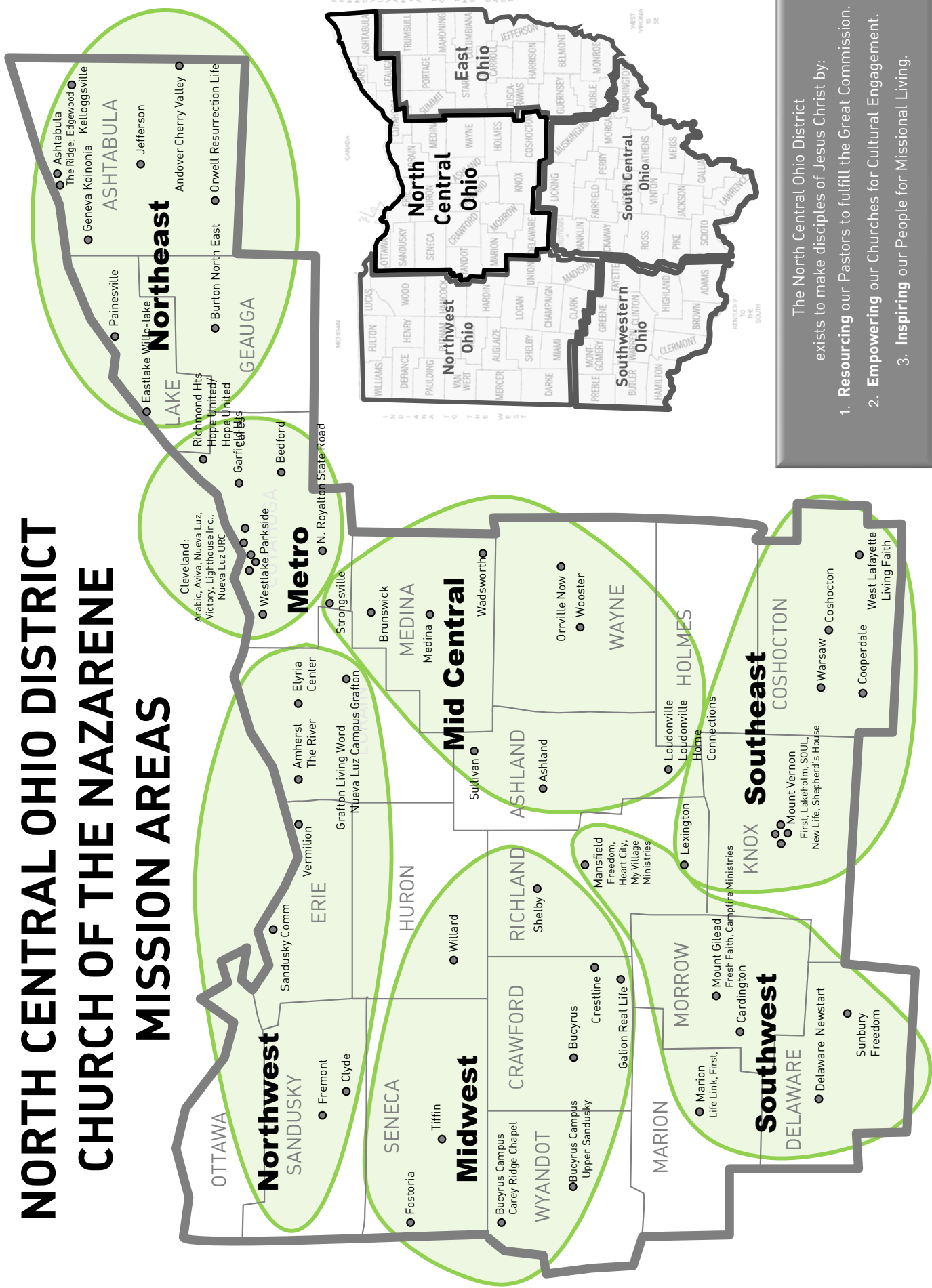
