

GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT IN JURISDICTION



Dr. Gustavo A. Crocker was elected the 41st general superintendent of the Church of the Nazarene at the 28th General Assembly in Indianapolis, Indiana, in June 2013.

Prior to his election, Crocker had served as Eurasia regional director since 2004. Previously, he was senior vice president for programs at World Relief Corporation. Gustavo joined World Relief after serving as director of field management for Compassion International. Other ministry included several years as administrative director of Nazarene Compassionate Ministries International in Kansas City, Missouri, and three years as regional coordinator of Nazarene Compassionate Ministries out of Quito, Ecuador.

A Guatemalan by birth, Dr. Crocker was ordained as an elder in the Church of the Nazarene on the Mid-Atlantic District. He is a licensed architect with a master's degree in community planning from the University of Cincinnati, where he attended as a Fulbright Scholar. As a Latin

American Leadership Scholar, he earned a Ph.D. in organizational leadership at Regent University. In 2014, Olivet Nazarene University honored him with a Doctor of Divinity degree for his contribution to the development of the global church.

Dr. Crocker has taught in various universities in Latin America, Europe, and the United States. He has also been a guest lecturer at several seminaries, colleges, and universities in the United States, Latin America, Asia, and Europe. Proficient in several languages, Dr. Crocker has authored several books and articles in Spanish and English, and his writings have been translated into more than 20 languages.

Dr. Crocker and his wife, Rachel, have two grown daughters, Raquel and Beth.





ASSEMBLY FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

2022

The Assembly Finance Committee of North Central Ohio met at the Brunswick Church on May 7, 2022 with the following members present: Wendell D. Brown, District Superintendent; Austin Swallow, Chairman; T.J. McNew III, secretary; Patrick L. Rhoton, ex officio, District Treasurer; Cecil Curtis, NDI Chair; Ryan Brown, Bernie Dickson, Steve Estep, Wade Gray, Josh Kirby, Terry Johnstone, Bill Purtee, Bob Robbins, and Linda Wasil.

We, your committee on finance, submit the following recommendations to the Annual District Assembly and go on record instructing the local churches to comply with the following:

Funding the Mission

The stewardship of the local church is a very sacred responsibility that requires administration. As part of the denominational organization, each local pastor and church embraces their responsibility of supporting the North Central Ohio District, Mount Vernon Nazarene University and the global church and its missionaries. Just as individuals are instructed in the Word (Malachi 3:8-10) to bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, so should a local church set aside a portion of the tithes and offerings they receive to share with others. Each pastor and congregation should make adequate provision in their yearly budget planning process for their assigned commitment to the district, the university and the general church. The Finance Committee recommends weekly or monthly support.

Each church should remit payment for all funds using the Funding the Mission link, located on the district website, located on the district website www.ncodistrict.org/treasurers or the denominational website www.fundingthemission.org. This interactive website offers a "track giving" tab which has been designed to help local churches monitor their progress towards full payment of their allocations as well as several other features that add value.

Each church, in accordance with the formula set out by the global church to shall give at least

- 5.50% of its income base to the World Evangelism Fund (WEF)
- 2.25% of its income base to Pensions and Benefits
- 2.25% of its income base to Mount Vernon Nazarene University
- 4.65% of its income base to the District Fair Share Fund

This covers all district operations, provides for district ministry support and the three departments (NYI, NMI and NDI).

Notes: Amounts given to WEF and approved mission specials are excluded from the income base and NOT to be included when figuring total income. Church income is any donation received by the church that qualifies as a charitable contribution. All donations that qualify to appear on a charitable contribution receipt are included in church income. This includes all non-cash donations of \$5,000 or more.

Pastoral Support

A. The support of a pastor is a sacred honor and responsibility of the church board. Manual 32.3 states: **The church is obligated to** support its ministers, who have been called of God, and who, under the direction of the church, have given themselves wholly to the work of the ministry.

B. As a district, we understand more than 40% of our pastors are considered bi-vocational. As such, we encourage congregations not to demand or even suggest that a person needing to work outside the church to provide for their families commit full-time service to the church. Furthermore, any spousal income should have NO bearing in determining financial compensation for the pastor.

C. Therefore, we suggest each church board designate a committee (be it the Finance or Personnel Committee or a separate standalone committee) to oversee the care of the pastoral family(ies) shepherding their congregation.

D. As part of the process of calling a new pastor, that a compensation agreement detailing the annual salary, benefits and reimbursements be drafted and signed to avoid misunderstanding by either party prior to the beginning of the relationship. Manual 115.4.

Copies should be sent to the district office and entered into the official church board minutes.

i. The district has provided a compensation worksheet to assist this process, located on the district website www.ncodistrict.org/treasurers.

E. That annually, the church board review all pastoral staff compensation and adjust in accordance with stated pastoral performance goals for the year and the income of the church. Manual 129.8

i. When conducting said compensation review, church boards be reminded of the difference between a COLA (cost of living adjustment) and a salary increase. A COLA simply brings a pastoral salary up to last year's level. It is not an increase.

ii. Employee benefits and reimbursement adjustments are handled differently by the IRS and are not considered salary increases. While appreciated, these adjustments generally have minimal impact on the financial welfare of the pastoral family.

F. The general church has informative resources that are readily available as well. These may be found at pbusa.org/memos.

Compensation Package Part 1: Cash Salary

Actual cash salary is but one part of a compensation package for a full-time pastor. Provisions for housing, appropriate benefits, plus reimbursements for applicable business and professional expenses, and providing for retirement equal the entire compensation package which are the church's responsibility.

Above all, we are reminded while there is no one definitive source a church board can look at to determine an equitable compensation for their leaders, we urge local church boards to consider the following resources:

- Our district superintendent

- The Pensions and Benefits office of the general church which has an annual compensation by size and location report posted under the resource tab http://pbusa.org/pbusacalculator

- Local sources, such as the school board and/or hospital salary scales

Most importantly, the central objective of a church's compensation package should be to allow a pastor to effectively carry out his/her responsibility to the church and to God, both administratively and spiritually while not having to worry about providing for his/her family.

1. With the recent changes in tax law, it is important to remember each church board should attempt to structure compensation packages to help the pastor minimize their annual tax liability.

2. All employees, ministerial or lay, must be provided a W-2 each year which reflects cash salary paid as compensation, any bonus or love offering, social security/Medicare tax allowances and taxable fringe benefits.

Compensation Package

Part 2: Housing Allowance

Whether the local church still maintains a parsonage for their pastor(s) or provides rental or mortgage assistance, the federal tax code (Section 107) contains wording that creates a substantial tax benefit to pastors.

In the case of a minister of the gospel, gross income DOES NOT include

1. the rental value of a home furnished to him/her as part of their compensation OR

2. the rental allowance paid to him/her as part of their compensation, to the extent used by him/her to rent or provide a home and to the extent such allowance does not exceed the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the utilities and reasonable repair costs.

Bi-vocational ministers may have a housing allowance, but only from their ministerial income. It can however, be up to 100% of that compensation. It cannot exceed it.

Each church board must designate this amount in advance (with official action and recorded in the minutes). It is suggested church boards either make this declaration part of the agenda for the first meeting of each calendar year or make the wording open-ended enough upon hire to cover from that point forward.

While excluded from federal income tax, housing allowances must be included for Social Security and Medicare tax purposes (SECA) in those computations. Church treasurers are urged to work with their pastor(s) to ensure compliance with the tax code and reporting. Additional assistance is available from the district finance team and the general church Pensions and Benefits website pbusa.org/memos.

	Compensation Package
	Part 3: Benefits
Self-Employment Tax:	(SECA) Most laity do not realize the Social Security rules for pastors are different and each pastor must pay this tax. It is currently 15.3% of reported cash income. Each church should budget for this amount when determining pastoral compensation.
Retirement:	Supporting pastors in retirement requires planning and saving, just like it does for laity. Whether churches use the Nazarene 403(b) retirement savings plan or work with their pastor(s) on an individualized plan, a designated amount should be set aside monthly as part of their compensation. Designated amounts can be sheltered from income tax.
Health Insurance:	No pastoral family should serve without health (including dental) insurance coverage. With the passage of the Affordable Care Act back in 2010, those who cannot find an available and applicable group policy, may purchase insurance through government-supported plans. The enrollment period is in the fall of each year. In the case of a bi-vocational pastor or a pastor whose spouse has an insurance option available, the church board should work to provide either the monthly premium or applicable spousal contribution amount.

Life and Disability:	If possible, policies are available at relatively low cost and should be considered as part of a compensation package. It is far better to plan ahead rather than have to face the issue of what to do if a pastor passes away or is disabled and unable to serve for an extended period of time.
Death Benefit:	The district provides a \$10,000 benefit to the designated beneficiary on file at the district office for any district lead pastor who passes while serving in that role. Please contact the district office for further details and beneficiary form.
Education:	The Nazarene church has long supported the educational aspirations of their pastors. Indeed, the creation of our Nazarene colleges and universities across the world have benefited our local congregations throughout the years. However, many pastors have significant educational debt and church boards should work to assist in the repayment of that debt AND/OR expenses should the pastor(s) wish to gain further education.
Vacation:	Each local church should provide for annual time away for their pastor(s). Our district recommendation is based on years of ministerial service: 1-5 years in the ministry 2 weeks (including 2 Sundays) 6-10 years in the ministry 3 weeks (including 3 Sundays) 10-15 years in the ministry 4 weeks (including 4 Sundays) over 15 years in the ministry 5 weeks (including 5 Sundays) That any pulpit supply be remunerated by the church. Furthermore, that each church should remember the pastor(s) and their family(ies) at Christmas with at least
Sabbatical:	an additional week's salary. Each church should establish a policy to respond to the need of pastors for withdrawal from the day-to-day rigors of an assignment for scholarly review and personal renewal. This policy should be planned for and
	included in the annual budgeting process. Within the seventh year of a ministry assignment, the pastor, be they serving in a senior pastorate or staff position, should develop and plan for his/her reflection and renewal for a period of time up to seven weeks and present the plan to their church board and the District Superintendent. A follow-up with "lessons learned" should also be presented to both the local church board and the District Superintendent.
Maternity/Paternity:	A maternity leave of six weeks and/or a paternity leave of two weeks is recommended upon the birth, adoption, or
Leave	assumption of legal guardianship of a child. We recommend an additional two weeks be granted for a birth by Cesarean section or other birthing complication(s). We recommend pastors receive their full salary and benefits while on such leave. Should a church have either a long-term or temporary disability plan that could be utilized in such a situation, we recommend that such a plan be used to offset the pastor's salary and benefits provided by the church during the maternity and/or paternity leave.

Compensation Package

Part 4: Business and Professional Reimbursements

With the 2017 tax reform, it behooves a pastor and church board to examine their reimbursement agreements. Unless a structure is set up to reimburse the pastor (upon receiving receipts within thirty (30) days and/or detailed documentation as to use, that money MUST be added to the annual W-2 as TAXABLE income to the pastor. The District Finance Committee recommends that each church board formally adopt and record a reimbursement policy to include:

• provisions for ministry use of an automobile (mileage at IRS standards)

• If a church provides a vehicle, the pastor must keep track (with detailed odometer readings) of miles used for personal use which includes driving to and from the church from home.

- Business-related entertainment
- professional books and magazines
- professional membership dues
- stationery and stamps for ministry use
- cell phone
- educational expenses: to include seminars for ongoing learning (see benefits)

Many of these expenses should be included in your annual budgeting process.

Furthermore, it is recommended each church budget for and pay all expenses for

• the pastoral family to attend district meetings such as district assembly, district family camp, district gatherings, and pastor and spouses' retreats.

• if at all possible, to allow the pastor (and family) to attend the General Assembly by providing for their expenses. Since this global church event is held once every four years, the church board is advised to set aside an amount in their annual budgets to offset these expenses. Time spent attending assemblies or gatherings should NOT be considered part of a pastor's vacation time.

The district has a compensation worksheet available on the district website www.ncodistrict.org/treasurers. It is strongly advised each church board annually use this form which then should be forwarded to the district superintendent each year.

Local Church Procedures

A. That a committee of two or more non-related individuals shall count and record all money received by the church. (Manual 129.22)

B. That the church board arranges for an annual financial review of the treasurer's books and that each church that operates a daycare, elementary or secondary school additionally forward said financial review to the district superintendent within sixty (60) days of the close of the statistical year. (Manual 129.23)

C. That the treasurer's book be open at all times to the pastor and the district superintendent or their designate.

D. In no case should a person serve as treasurer of a local church who is not willing to conform to the position(s) of the Manual.E. All elected or appointed church officials, with the exemption of the pastor(s), shall serve without remuneration.

F. That when payment of funds has been approved by the church board, that such payment should be made as expediently as possible and for the purpose(s) designated.

G. In the handling of all funds for future expansion and development that such funds be deposited in a separate account and that no withdrawals be made without two signatures.

H. Each church shall implement a proper screening process for both volunteer and employed persons who work with children and teens as it pertains to sexual and physical abuse (Manual 129.30) including budgeting for appropriate background checks. We further recommend that insurance programs be reviewed periodically in this area.

I. When calling an evangelist to conduct a meeting at a local church: that their remuneration be twice the weekly salary of the senior pastor, plus SECA expense and one-way travel.

J. That in the annual budgeting process, a goal of at least 10 percent of all money received be paid to the World Evangelism Fund (WEF) and approved specials with priority being given to WEF.

K. That the local church financially supports any student attending Mount Vernon Nazarene University with a minimum scholarship of \$1,000.

District Policies and Procedures

A. It is the local church's responsibility to budget for and pay all general, district, and university allocations. Manual 130. The District Advisory Board will appoint a committee to assist any church unable to pay their annual budgets with setting a balanced budget for the upcoming district year.

B. When a local church has not paid budgets in full for two (2) consecutive years or has not had at least one (1) conversion by profession of faith, no member of that church's congregation may be entered into nomination for an elected district office/board position. (District Advisory Board 8/2018)

C. The District Advisory Board has adopted criteria for potentially closing a church per Manual 106. When 3 of the 4 criteria for consideration are present for two years, the church will be considered for closure at the first DAB meeting of the following assembly year. (District Advisory Board 10/2018)

D. No congregation may undertake a building expansion and/or remodeling project that exceed 10% of the annual amount raised for all purposes until such proposed expenditures are approved by the District Church Properties Board Manual 234

E. A district allocation exemption will be made available to congregations conducting a capital stewardship campaign which has been approved by the District Properties Board. To qualify, a project must equal or exceed the annual income of the church. The exemption will extend for three years and will only apply to giving designated for the approved project.

F. Any district church or compassionate ministry receiving district support shall apply annually for renewal. Applications are due August 1st of each year with decisions being made to fund at the August District Advisory Board meeting. Successful applicants shall make a report to the following assembly.

G. Pastors and church boards are reminded that before hiring pastoral staff members and/or during the annual rehiring process, approval of the district superintendent must be obtained Manual 129.2

H. When there is a pastoral change at a district church, the District Finance Committee will appoint a representative to conduct a review of the church's financial records, policies and procedures and present a report to the District Superintendent and the District Advisory Board prior to the calling of a new pastor. (District Advisory Board 11/2019)

I. If a district ministry department (NMI, NDI, or NYI) should for any reason overspend its budget in one district year, that same amount will be reduced from the next budget cycle. (District Advisory Board 3/2018)

J. Any district sponsored group travel shall be coordinated through the approved travel agency on file at the district office. No individual arrangements are to be made. (District Advisory Board 8.18)

K. In the event of a merger between two churches, a property transference agreement should be completed, and a copy submitted to the district office. (District Advisory Board 10/2019)

L. Per IRS regulations, any self-employed individual or an unincorporated business receiving \$600 or more from a church or ministry during the calendar year must receive a Form 1099-MISC showing the compensation amount.

M. As part of his/her yearly responsibilities, the District Treasurer will contract with an accredited accounting firm to conduct a certified financial review of the district's finances for that year. Said review will be completed prior to and included in the printed assembly journal.

N. We recommend each church utilize the Church of the Nazarene Foundation to facilitate planned and deferred gifts from their members to any Nazarene ministry, including gifts to the local church, and to use the foundation to manage investment accounts, endowments or charitable trusts. Information can be found at cnf.NazareneFoundation.org or by calling 866-273-2549.

O. The Assembly Finance Committee Secretary shall be authorized to edit the Assembly Finance Committee Report as needed and appropriate.

IV. Finances

A. That a sub-committee of the Finance Committee be charged with creating a yearly budget to be presented to the full committee for their review and recommendation to the District Advisory Board.

B. That the Advisory Board be authorized, in their discretion, to make proper adjustments in the event of inequity in the application of the Pensions and Benefits Fund for a deceased minister's family if the local church has not paid their budgets in full.
 C. That the Fair Share district budget as recommended by the district Finance Committee and approved by the District Advisory Board is 4.75%.

V. Education

- A. That each church on the district welcomes representatives from Mount Vernon Nazarene University. We urge our churches to cooperate fully in supporting our Nazarene educational institutions, including Nazarene Theological Seminary and Nazarene Bible College by receiving a generous annual offering. We also urge our church attendees to support Mount Vernon Nazarene University by participating in their employer's matching fund program. (For church's reporting purposes, the personal contribution portion may be applied to the assigned educational budget of the local church but NOT the matching fund portion.)
- B. That the pastor's continuing education is important. The district has set aside funds to assist pastors who desire to pursue advanced degrees. A set amount will be placed in the yearly budget and distributed until depleted. Applications will be due by June 15th for the following Fall semester and grants awarded following the August District Advisory Board meeting.
- C. It is our desire to help build up a new generation of top talent for the district and the church in general. The district has adopted a policy for supporting such calls. Based on the model of investing in an individual's promise in return for a prescribed period of working to repay the investment, the district will identify such worthy individuals upon a pastor or professor's recommendation and application process. (District Advisory Board 8/2020)
- D. Per agreement with Mount Vernon Nazarene University, all funds given over 85% of the University's allocation in any given year will be directed to the district's endowed scholarships housed within the university's endowment.

In August of 2021, Ashtabula First celebrated our 100th anniversary. Over an entire weekend we engaged the community through an outdoor concert, a Christian comedian, food vendors, special speakers, children's games, a juggler, inflatables and rides. Then we finished it all off with a fish fry and BBQ. Those that were already part of the church could not believe such a large event was taking place on our

church grounds. Others who came by community invitation were impacted by the care of the volunteers, the music and worship, the attention given to the children, and the speakers who lifted the name of Jesus. A young man named Michael who did not know the Lord was invited to help on set-up day by our Family Life Pastor. Over 4 days he heard about the good news of Jesus, and he saw it lived out by the church. In the weeks following, he began attending Sunday morning services and other events, and he helped with facility renovation projects. In February he gave his life to Jesus and in March he was baptized. His is just one story of many from our celebration weekend.



In November, our church voted to merge the Geneva Church of the Nazarene as a campus location. Everything passed and as of January 1st, two churches became one. On Easter Sunday 2021 we became known as The Ridge Nazarene Church.

We have continued to improve technology and encourage chat during services; and most recently, we contracted a digital marketing professional to use social media more effectively.

This past year we held our 15th annual NazCar Cruise In, continued our 30 plus years of the Whosoever Club in the local low-income housing areas, hosted our 2nd Upward Soccer league season and 1st Community Night of Worship, and sent a team of 13 to the Native American Christian Academy for work and witness.

Aviva Church launched officially on April 3, 2022. The year prior to launching, we reconnected with people in the community, calling them to be part of the work by believing in Jesus and the church again. We are specifically serving the dechurched and unchurched Latino community in Cleveland near the densest population of Hispanic and Latino residents in the state of Ohio, where there are 64% Latinos from various nations (MetroWest, 2018). In America today, 1 in 4 people under the age of 30 are Latino-Americans, and the second generation is the largest growing generation (Valdez & Tran, 2020). In the past few months, we have noticed the average age of our church has dropped significantly. We are reaching youth and young adults.

As part of our pre-launch, we dedicated six months to teaching the Emotionally Healthy Church and building a culture around our vision to restore, transform, and empower. We formed a leadership team of 12 people to serve in various areas and connected them to mentors for their personal leadership development. The leadership team represents different Latino/Hispanic countries and generations. This summer, youth, outreach, marriage/family, and small group ministries are launching teams within our church with a missional focus.

We often hear people say, "I feel welcomed here." Every Sunday, people are giving their lives to Jesus and committing to the church. Extended families and multiple generations are worshiping together. This looks like first-generation parents answering altar calls with their second-generation adult children, and their children's children. Cousins, brothers, sisters, sons-in-law, grandparents, etc. are coming together to worship at Aviva with people of different Latino nations (Puerto Rico, Mexico, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Honduras, Peru, and more.)

We are excited to baptize for the first time this year and continue to call many to Jesus, the church, and empower them to function in their gifts and go and make disciples.

After 2 years of COVID and the fear associated with this infection, our folks are returning to worship services for the most part.

1. At NLURC we were able to re-imagine ourselves and now we deliver food bags Monday-Thursday to around 640 families a year. A car was donated to us to make those deliveries.

2. Our Garfield church continues to draw folks that live and represent our community, and our leadership is thinking of creative ways to do ministry in the coming year.

3. Both Garfield and NLURC continue to be the place where people find hope and are able to survive emotionally, spiritually, and physically.

Salient Realities:

1. The lack of housing is rampant in Cleveland and Lorain among low-income people, and we have 8 members of our staff preventing evictions and making sure people have a roof over their heads.

2. God has opened an open door of ministry with refugee youth from Africa and Afghanistan and our ministry is now collaborating with an organization called The Refugee Response. We have been engaging them in the last month, and from June-August, we will run a Summer Camp for them teaching them Shao Lin Kung Fu and boxing. We have 24 young people engaged in the program so far.

3. Due to over 3 decades of ministry in Cleveland, the newly elected Mayor of Cleveland, Justin Bibb, requested Pastor Max Rodas to be one of the ministers that prayed over him as he was inaugurated in his new office.

HeavenTrain is up and running! All glory to God for answering prayers that He would bring more children to hear His Word. The Lord provided excellent weather on both HeavenTrain days in May as we saw a total of 466 children and caregivers who came to learn about God in Cleveland's Central neighborhoods. We are seeing lots of returning HeavenTrain kids - adults included - as well as new children.

May's Bible verse "For the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." Joshua 1:9 (sung to the tune of "She'll be coming 'round the mountain...") is a repeat of the October 2021 Bible verse as we transition to this season's Bible lessons focusing on the Fruit of the Spirit from Galatians 5:22-23. June's Bible lesson will begin with the Fruit of LOVE; love covers everything as the Apostle Paul wrote to the Corinthians "But the greatest of these is love." (1 Corinthians 13:13b) We are encouraged to see the children are learning and retaining God's Word through the mini-Vacation Bible School format as we teach them through songs, Bible verse activities, and the Bible lesson; some children are even recalling verses from last season's teachings!

On Saturday, May 28th, Pastor Judy Bean, HeavenTrain Coordinator who leads the teaching team, had many notable conversations with our HeavenTrain kids; she said, "I would have to write a book if I mentioned them all." Here are two of them: One little boy asked me as he got off the bus, "Will I see Jesus when I die?" I told him, "Yes, if you ask Him into your heart." He then made a big fist bump and yelled out a big, "YES!" Another little girl was telling Pastor Judy her Bible verse and when asked what she thought it meant, she replied, "He will be near me wherever I am, but only if He's in my heart". Pastor Judy reflected that she thought it was notable that many of the responses came from boys. Usually, girls at that age seem to pay more attention.

A high praise to the Lord for our faithful servants of the Lord who make the choice to serve on HeavenTrain all day, in the mornings or in the afternoons. We welcome guests to experience HeavenTrain for up to three visits before deciding to become a regular team member. We pray for additional bus drivers, food truck & trailer drivers and screened team members as they are always needed. We also praise the Lord for the food preparation team led joyfully by HeavenTrain's Lunch Program Coordinator, Mary Smith. Nueva Luz just recently opened another Hispanic/Latino Church at Harvest Fellowship Church of the Nazarene in Grafton and we work in collaboration with Pastor Max Wood precisely because we are not ashamed of the Gospel. Just recently 4 souls were delivered from substance use disorders at the church in Grafton. Nueva Luz continues to thrive and flourish by preaching, teaching, and healing individuals, families, and communities through the Gospel of Jesus Christ under the anointing of the Holy Spirit.

Nueva Luz houses two additional programs as an indication that we are not ashamed of the Gospel. The Thriving Church Ministry Program and the Substance Use Disorder Training/Educational Program. The Thriving Church Ministry Program is a mentoring program

that provides pastors and church leaders with practical skills for effective ministry and for transformative and adaptive leadership. The Substance Use Disorder Training and Educational Program provides training to pastors and church leaders on how to deal with individuals with substance use disorders. This year over 40 pastors and church leaders received these trainings and were certified by the Ohio Chemical Dependency Professional Board. Pastors and church leaders learned how to do assessments evaluations, individual therapy, group therapy, and referrals. All these programs are biblically based and theologically sound because we at Nueva Luz believe that the Gospel of Jesus Christ has the power and is the power of God that brings salvation, liberation, and healing.







More and more people are returning to the Church they grew up in. One couple tepidly returned for the first time since their teens last November. The husband was reserved, cross-armed perhaps a little fearful. Three weeks later they joined in every event with enthusiasm. They are growing in faith, listening carefully, asking many questions, and willing to volunteer at every turn. They are not yet members!

Another family has returned after 60 years. Married in the church, his parents were founding members. Now with the church close to their home it has become their old age passion to help, encourage and join. The wife was the first person to take the new membership class.

I asked a person who started faithfully attending our church just a few months ago when he started walking with Jesus. He was not able to say the day. However, he said that he had greatly grown in his spiritual life in the last few months. He is not yet a member.

2.Renewing a 100-year-old building

The building is an icon in the community. Every Sunday the bell rang for church. The last renovation was in the 1970s. A paint job has turned into full renovation with dozens involved and thousands donated. All debt free. Many in the community are surprised.

3.Wednesday night discipleship/youth

Three years ago we started free meals and teaching on Wednesday nights. Between 5 to 15 teens attend with 3 to 10 children and 10 to 20 adults. Most are from the local community. The numbers are increasing.

4.Re-organized leadership / Church board

After several years without a functioning Nazarene structure, the church elected all new leaders this year.

5.Increased attendance

6. We average 48 on Sunday but with 78 regular people and 43 first-time visitors in the past 5 months. This shows life and opportunity.

Within 3 miles of our church are nearly 3,000 people, within a 15-minute drive there are more than 20,000. Our church could plant 10 churches of 70 people like ours in Coshocton County and not touch many unreached people. The Church board set a goal of 15 new believers, 15 new baptisms, and 20 new members this year.

The life of a pastor can be challenging. The main reason is that we are called to work with people and people can be variable. A second challenging factor can be changing circumstances; Covid comes to mind. But no matter, because our God is bigger and has more power and resources available than anything that we may face, and that is the good news that keeps us doing what we do every day.

Crestline Nazarene is a good example of a normal church. Attendance has been declining for several years for legitimate reasons. It might be a good time to give up, but the people here have a vision of what God can do and have been faithfully putting forth their time, talents, and treasures to see things turn around. Let me give you three examples.

First, we have more than 20 people involved in our monthly food pantry that helps to feed around 50 families every month, with enough food to provide over 1000 meals. This is done because of the diligent efforts of Karen Eichelberger and her helpers who unload trucks, organize and box up the food and then meet again on Saturday morning to distribute it to waiting cars.

Second, we have started a midweek women's Bible study that meets every Thursday morning with 9-12 each week in attendance.

Third, we have started a new adult Sunday school class that is being taught by Reverend John Ernsberger. John and his wife Cindy have brought a breath of fresh air to our congregation. They served Crestline Nazarene Church several years ago and already know most of the people, so it's like they've come back home. The old saying is that you can't go home again. John and Cindy disprove that. I am glad they are here.

Cindy and I have been here less than a year and have fallen in love with this wonderful family of God who work tirelessly for His kingdom. I wish I had time to tell you about the one who gives hours to the music program; or the one who stops at the church a few times a week "to tend things" before even going home after working a 12-hour night shift; or the person who is wheeled in to teach a Sunday School class after being released on Friday from a week-long hospital stay. Time fails me to talk about our planning for a VBS this August or our Sunday morning service being live-streamed with 300-500 folks watching every week.

In closing Crestline Nazarene is alive and moving forward. We have decided to put off our death and allow the Lord to resurrect the church.

I believe the best way to spread the Gospel is through relationships. This last year our church has had countless opportunities to build relationships in and around our community. These ministry "wins" are very hard to measure, they don't always equate to first=time visitors. However, I am very excited about our church's engagement in Galion. People all around our town are hearing about Real Life and the impact being made in this community.

- Fellowship of Christian Athletes has hired Pastor Hunter as their Ambassador over the surrounding counties with the intention to soon hire him as FCA Director over the same area. Through many meetings, we will open FCA in Buckeye Central, Wynford, and Crestline in the Fall. Galion's FCA has now been open for 2 years.

- Pastor Hunter preaches in Galion H.S. to both the girls & boys' basketball programs and is now a track coach during the spring season.

- Real Life received a grant to help fund a \$12,500 playground that will be opened to the public leaving only \$1,700 outof-pocket expenses.

- Working annually with the League of Rider's Motorcycle Club to host a scavenger cruise to raise money for specific needs for our children's ministry. The founder of the club and owner of the tattoo/vape shop downtown sits regularly to talk about Scripture with us.

-Meraki Counseling LLC is now run through the back end of our church facility.

-Galion's AA and Alanon meet in our church 3x/week.

-Crawford County's Safety Council will meet 1x/month in our Dome beginning in June.

-We have counted over 100 new Sunday visitors over the last year; many are still attending, several became members, and quite a few are now tithing.

-We co-lead a parenting group led by the local coffee shop owner who does not attend church and yet has a deep relationship with two of our members.

-Pastor Hunter's kids have made an impact on the tattoo artist downtown; now when he walks in the coffee shop Ryiah and Ezekiel scream, "Marcus" and ask, "Do you have any new tattoos?"

-Congregational Worship has improved where many feel we are more open to the moving of the Spirit of God. -Galion Police Department has requested Pastor Hunter to be sworn in in July as their Police Chaplain; Real Life Nazarene will host the Police Department every year during an appreciation dinner. This has not happened in over a decade.

The good news of Jesus' love for everyone is alive and real; but, it takes time and intentional actions to build relationships. Our church is striving to see the opportunities and seize the moments to plant a seed where relationships can be nurtured. This last year, we adopted new Mission and Vision Statements. The goal of which is to restructure our church to meet those outside of our walls and create more potential to plant. 

The business of the church is to share the Good News, and business is good at Marion Naz! Children are responding to the Gospel. In September 2021 we added a children's and teen element to our Celebrate Recovery program that meets on Thursday nights. We have experienced great growth and are regularly seeing 200+ people every week who are finding freedom from their hurts, habits, and hangups. Elementary-aged siblings Matthew and Yasmina live in the neighborhood and began attending without their parents. They were warmly welcomed. They learned that God loved them and felt that love through His people. Both Matthew and Yasmina became followers of Jesus. It wasn't long before their mom Naomi came with them. During her first time at Marion Naz, she committed her life to Jesus. On Easter weekend all three of them were baptized.

Teenagers are responding to the Gospel. Ava grew up in an atheistic home. Invited by a friend she began attending our youth group. She became a follower of Jesus and at our youth retreat in 2022 Ava felt that God was calling her to ministry. (18 people in the last 4 ½ years have felt that call at Marion Naz). When Ava was baptized on Easter Sunday, many of her family members, including her atheist parents, were there to see it and to hear her incredible testimony. They have returned several times and their interest in Jesus is growing.

Michael is a 41-year-old who by his own admission went his whole life without taking any responsibility for his actions, addictions, or failures. It was always easier to blame someone else, and he did. That changed on a Sunday morning when the Spirit drew him, and he said yes to becoming a follower of Jesus. For the first time in his life, Michael owned his sin, confessed it, and experienced the hope that can only be found in Jesus! He and his son were baptized a few weeks later.

God is blessing the proclamation of the Gospel to all ages at the downtown campus, Kensington Campus, Celebrate Recovery, in our life groups, and as Marion Nazarenes are sharing the good news of Jesus with their friends. Good News is our business. Business is good!

God continues to enable the Body at Life Link to extend the good news of Jesus into our community. Paul is one of our Board Members and spearheads our recovery-support ministries. Some folks in recovery are hesitant to name their Higher Power as God; Paul has no such hesitation. He boldly and unapologetically looks for opportunities to share his testimony of victory in Jesus over & over again. Whether at the Bible study group he participates in weekly at the jail, or at the 8 recovery support group meetings 6 days a week he participates in onsite at Life Link, he remains so excited and impassioned by the transformational work of God in his life since 1971 that he has a 3-minute sand timer he uses in his group meetings to nudge him toward brevity. Being the resident preacher, I have not encouraged him to share that such a device is kept in our building. ;-)

We hosted a party for Paul earlier this year celebrating his 50th year of sobriety. It was beautiful to see all those who came giving testimony to the impact Paul has had and continues to have across our community. With the recovery-support groups as an entry point to Life Link we have had the opportunity to pray for salvation with multiple participants. We seek to build genuine relationships with group members and some now volunteer with our facility maintenance & our compassionate ministries. And having group members join in Ash Wednesday, Lent, Good Friday, Advent, and Christmas Eve special services is one of my favorite things.

There is some overlap between our recovery-support ministry and our food pantry. Those new to recovery are often also needing assistance with food, and thankfully God has positioned us to meet this need. Some recovery participants, once sober, go on to work/volunteer in social service areas. They then have the opportunity to direct others back to our ministries. The need for food pantry assistance is currently experiencing an explosive year-over-year 500% increase. We praise God that His guidance & provision had us staffed and stocked to meet this need.

We are a body of people eager to share the good news of Jesus through tangible ministries like a food

pantry and traditional ministries like church worship services. Whatever is required to give encouragement to the confined, administrate ministries, care for facilities, enable worship, connect needs to intercessors, feed the hungry, preach good news to the poor, release to the captive, and liberty to the oppressed in our neighborhood is what we endeavor, by God's grace, to be.

God is on the move here at Mt. Vernon First Church. As we have slowly emerged from the pandemic this last year, we have seen God's hand at work in so many lives. A few of those stories:

• Sam had been struggling with addiction and alcoholism. Her life felt hopeless. A friend invited her to one of the services in the fall. Hesitant, she decided to watch online for a few weeks before she attended. After watching online, she "knew" she needed to come to church. During her second week attending, she yielded her life fully to God. On Easter, she was baptized. Today she celebrates sobriety, overcoming addiction, and God's amazing love demonstrated by not giving up on her.



• April was invited to our church by someone she met at work. She repeatedly responded that "no church would accept her." Her life had been filled with pain, regrets, hurt, and

disappointment. Yet, her friend didn't give up. Finally, one Sunday, she attended. She would later tell us that she didn't remember much from her first service at First Church because she wept. She was overwhelmed by the love, acceptance, and hopefulness offered to her that day. In March, April and her husband became members, attended a small group, and are now seen smiling and shaking hands with new friends every Sunday.

• Tina attended our church for years, but as an aid helping a patient. She would listen to the messages and enjoy the music but was more concerned about doing her job than her consumption. One weekend, her daughter stopped by her house unannounced, dropped off her two kids, and disappeared. Tina knew she had struggled with addiction but underestimated how ugly it had become. Scared and unsure where to turn, she called a family she met through our church. Through them, Tina contacted the pastoral staff, and within hours, food, clothing, rent help, and babysitters were made available. Tina was overwhelmed by the support. Through the experience, she has found what she calls her "childhood" faith. The faith she had as a child, but she lost in the cold complicated world of adulthood. Each week she, her grandkids, and lately, her daughter worship together with a new sense of hope.

• Not only are we celebrating lives changed at First Church, but we are also celebrating our 100th Anniversary, 9 baptized on Easter, a remodel, growth in nearly every area of ministry, and the addition of new staff! What a great year!!

There have been many great things going on through the ministry of New Life over this past year. Here are just a few stories. One man was married previously to a licensed pastor, who had an affair with another pastor. He was deeply hurt. He has since remarried and is finding great healing, community, and a renewed sense of his call to ministry while being a part of New Life Church. There's another couple whose marriage is being reconciled. Their kids were baptized. And they're growing as a family.

There's a couple with young kids who had been struggling in their marriage and were separated. The wife's parents had been attending New Life and invited them to come. The couple's 9-year-old daughter was also invited to New Life by a friend from school. She and her siblings loved it so much that they encouraged their mom to keep coming back. And she did! After they had been attending New Life for several months, the mom encountered Jesus in such a real way that she made steps to reconcile her marriage. The couple has now reconciled, and reunited as a family and the couple is going to marriage counseling. They've been attending church together as a family every week. All of their kids have chosen to follow Jesus and their daughter was baptized this winter!

Good things have been happening in the teen group. They did a work trip to Appalachia Reach Out in Eastern Kentucky. They had several teens come back saying there was a change in them that happened on the trip and had several parents witness change in teens. They spent the whole week working hard and selflessly. I believe many of them gained a heart for missions and serving others in need. Regarding the fall teen retreat, we had many teens coming forward to pray and say "Yes" to Jesus in some way, either for the first time or in surrender in another area of their life.

We have had several new attenders join our women's Bible study over the past several months and really start to dig in and build community. It's been fun to watch them start to reach out to each other. The IF Gathering was also a step toward building community with women as well.

There's a couple who hadn't felt connected/supported in a faith family as they have been raising one of their children that needs extra care. They have felt very alone and haven't been in a church service together for years. The family heard about our Buddy Ministry, visited, and is now becoming a regular part of our church, allowing God to heal and restore them.

One lady and her family had not been able to attend church together for years due to the needs of one of her children. Through word in the community of our Buddy Ministry, she and her family have been able to be connect with the church together. As a result of her family being connected and growing, their high school-aged daughter has recently given her life to the Lord and was baptized.

What are we willing to risk for the sake of the gospel? Where do we place our confidence and to whom do we pledge our ultimate allegiance? How much do we value the truths entrusted to us?

What about a mother who had been separated from her two daughters at the border for over two years? What is the gospel? Being reunited? We have invested in bringing a mother and her two daughters to Mount Vernon. We have invested in legal assistance. We have traveled to asylum hearings. We have prayed.

One of the children was involved in an accident on a school playground and was taken to an Emergency Room. Through a translator, the mother was asked about her religion to which she replied: Shepherd's House!

Mustard seeds of grace-filled acts of loving obedience. We are blessed with new life in several families where the "little sprouts" have brought joy. We are blessed to be present in the lives of several of our online families who invest in the good news through prayer and sharing resources. We are blessed with story after story which proves to us that we have formed an alliance with the King of Kings and Lord of Lords as we understand that the essential underlying element of the gospel is: Jesus is Lord. We wrestle with the question: what would it look like if God was completely and totally in charge and Jesus was truly Lord? How can we as Shepherd's House be used to bring healing and hope to our community?

During Covid, my teenage son felt a burden to continue to minister to children even though we were not able to gather together in the building. He single-handedly prepared lessons, presented the lessons in front of a camera, edited the videos, uploaded the videos to servers, and worked hard on engagement so that children could still have consistency in discipleship.

He experienced the same disappointment and frustration every Christian leader did during this time, but he continued to push through finding new ways of presenting the materials and developing new partnerships with other children's ministry leaders across our district. As a result, it kept getting better and better.

When we opened after the shutdown, he was still busy at work serving and ministering to kids with the help and supervision of some amazing adult volunteers.

In April, he caught me after service to tell me that two of the children made first time decisions to follow Jesus. The Lord has given them a number of children they would like to see saved in this coming year. As a team, they are praying into that and I believe they are going to continue to see a harvest of souls.

I am proud of him and encouraged about the future of the Church. God has given us amazing students who have a heart for the Kingdom.






fit. Joey didn't expect to be accepted and loved at church because he has tattoos. Tattoos on his face. Joey doesn't (as he puts it) look very approachable. To Joey's surprise, he was accepted and loved at SCCN. Joey gave his life to Jesus and began our discipleship program on Wednesday evenings. Joey had to move away to continue his recovery, but Joey and I still keep in contact. He is still watching our services online and Jesus still has control of his life.

On March 29, 2020, two weeks after the world was closing shop due to the Covid 19 pandemic, and churches closed to services, I was set up for Facebook Live. Since that starting date, now over two years in, we have had over 15,000 people hear the Gospel message from around the world. Because the message each week is public, there is no way to know who is listening except if there is either a public or private response back to me. Every so often I get a message from a person who shares they are listening and how God spoke to them that day through the spoken Word. Typically, the responses are from those who would never darken the doors of a church building but can listen in the privacy of their own home. They are also from those who one would never guess would be listening just from their known worldly lifestyle.

So, every time a response comes, there is renewed affirmation that no one is exempt from the Gospel and the Good News message. It is also a renewed affirmation that no one is too "bad" to respond to God's love and grace.

15,000 people to date is an amazing figure considering that if we weren't on Facebook Live each week, the message would be to just us. Heaven only knows what has happened at this point in people's lives and the stories that one day will be shared because of a public forum to preach the Good News.

Other stories of what God is doing come from our church childcare ministry that continues to have stories of God speaking to children and adults. One little boy visiting with his family, watching a video of Jesus' death and resurrection, and never hearing that story, asked the question in Junior Church, "What did I do to make Jesus have to die for me?" That led to a beautiful explanation of the Good News of the story of Jesus.

The Good News story is as relevant today as ever and just as impactful and life-changing.

Report to the Assembly: What Good News story are you not ashamed to share? How has Jesus been shared with your community?

A phrase that you often hear with us is that we want to invite people to have their lives wrecked (in a good way) by the Gospel of Jesus Christ! This year I was given advice on how to conduct membership classes and one of the key things we implemented was a requirement for everyone to give their testimony. What started in these classes overflowed to our morning time of worship and others came forward to regularly share how God had changed their lives. People have testified and heard how the Good News outshines words like cancer and death. They heard how Christ brought people out of addiction and freed them from lifestyles that were nothing but filled with bondage. Accounts of Christ bringing marriages back from near-collapse were spoken and Christ was the reason for all of this!

Jesus Christ and the Good News have turned our lives upside down and I pray that we

share that message boldly with everyone that Christ puts into our paths. Romans 1:16: "For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes." Report to the Assembly: What Good News story are you not ashamed to share? How has Jesus been shared with your community?

This note, as written, was recently received from a little girl, new to our church. "You are the best 'paster' ever and your super nice thank you for washing away our sins that is 'alsome' that you love everyone. from Esmae." Her theology may be off, but she's quickly picked up that a major and constant emphasis at Wooster Naz is on people saying, "Yes to Jesus! [Y2J]" Through the power of the gospel, people of all ages are coming to faith in Jesus regularly.

Many go through our very strong BASICS Classes, the first of which we call "My Start." The gospel is clearly presented in every class with an opportunity to respond immediately by saying "Y2J." This challenge is accompanied by strong basic theology and practical disciplines of faith.

Our wonderful altars are used consistently in our gatherings. In response to the Holy Spirit, it's common for people to make a public profession of faith as they kneel, sit, or stand there before God and man.

Recently we conducted a memorial celebration for a senior adult who was promoted from here to heaven. Nancy and her husband came to faith and a personal relationship with Jesus when they were well beyond seventy ... at our altar!

We still do baby dedications, one Sunday a month, that touch the tender hearts of families and friends. One of the requirements is for the couple to meet privately with one of our pastors before the event. The primary purpose is to make sure the parents have a relationship with Jesus. In one of these very recent meetings, a father, a former agnostic, said "Y2J!"

We've had many baptisms this year and what celebrations they are! The emotions and exchanges around the "baptismal tank" are so powerful and moving as people testify of their love-relationship with Jesus. Baptisms are a definite favorite at Wooster Naz!

Finally, we lost a young firefighter, Phil, who died in the line of duty. He had come alive spiritually in recent months, was baptized, and was on fire for God. He "fell asleep" in the arms of Jesus, but the impact and influence of his life and love for God live on as new people are coming to church and saying "Y2J!" Phil was definitely "not ashamed of the gospel of Jesus Christ" ... and neither are we!!!











All counseling services are provided anonymously. The district simply receives an invoice for Jane or John Doe. This map shows the various locations. Contact information is included on the reverse side.

We serve a great God and I'm thankful for His call in your life. Our paths are often filled with bumps and potholes that even our most intense times of personal prayer and reflection are not enough. It is my desire and that of the Advisory Board that this additional resource will help to heal and equip your spirit, your marriage and your family.

When a local church has not paid budgets in full for two (2) consecutive years or has not had at least one (1) conversion by profession of faith, no member of that church's congregation may be entered into nomination for district advisory board or ministry department chair. (District Advisory Board 8/2018)

Pastor Brown reminded the committee of the following policies of the District Advisory Board to be considered: 8/25/18 Motion: (Dennis) Amended policy from 5/13/06: To be considered for service on District Advisory Board (Ministerial or Lay) the individual's local church must have all budgets paid and must have at least 1 new conversion by profession of faith Churches that have a history of paying budgets in full and who have a single year of not paying will not be barred from nomination. However, two consecutive years does prohibit nomination to designated boards. Motion carried

Best Financial Practices for District Ministry Departments/

Reimbursement/Check Requests/Budget/Large Purchases

District Ministry Department Budgets

If a district ministry department (NMI, SDMI or NYI) should for any reason over spend it's budget in one district year, that same amount will be reduced from the next budget cycle. (District Advisory Board 3/2018)

Mandatory Financial Review for Church in Transition

When there is a pastoral change at a district church, the District Finance Committee will appoint a representative to conduct a review of the church's financial records, policies and procedures and present a report to the District Superintendent and the District Advisory Board prior to the calling of a new pastor. (District Advisory Board 11/2019)

Property Transfer Agreement

As a district we uphold the idea that we are "Better Together". As such, when a larger church assumes the ministerial work at a smaller congregation's location; whether that work will be conducted through a merger or closing of the smaller congregation; the larger church would inherit the asset of the smaller churches property at a rate of 20% per year for 5 years. At the end of 5 years, the property will be considered 100% the asset of the church and would be free to be used in a n nner that blesses the congregation, even if that includes liquidating the property for the betterment of their financial picture. (District Finance Committee 7/31/2019)
